Attention, Mr. Juttner

In this morning's Standard and Miner you impute to Tim Nolan an attack on you in yesterday's Bulletin, in which you are branded as a criminal. Outside Agitators or Tax Dodgers?

The Hon. Con F. Kelley and the still more Hon. John D. Ryan deny that they are foreign agitators, imported into the state from New York City to influence the election, and declare that they are residents of Butte, Montana. If this be the fact, one would never suspect it from examining the assessment records of Silver Bow county. Under the Constitution of the state (that dear constitution which John and Con so dearly love), it is provided:

"All property shall be assessed in the manner prescribed by law, except as is otherwise provided in this constitution. The property as used in this article is hereby declared to include moneys, credits, bonds, stocks, franchises and all matters and things, real, personal and mixed capable of private ownership. But this shall not be construed so as to authorize the taxation of the stocks of any company or corporation when the property of such company or corporation represented by such stocks is within the state and has been taxed."

The above provisions will be found in Article 12 of the Constitution. And the effect of these provisions, as frequently declared by the supreme court of the state, is to require that moneys, credits, bonds and stocks must be taxed at the domicile of the owner. So it follows that if John and Con are residents of Butte, they should pay taxes in Butte upon all moneys, credits, bonds and stocks owned by them.

Look at the records of Silver Bow county. Will you find Con Kelley's ten million dollars worth of moneys, credits, bonds and stocks listed in Butte for taxation? You will not. Will you find John D's forty million dollars worth of moneys, credits, bonds and stocks listed here for taxation? You will not. Of course, they admit the existence of such mortgages as appear upon the public records. John admits that he has half a million of such mortgages. Con admits that he has fifty thousand. But as for moneys, credits, bonds and stocks, they both deny that they have any. We quote the tax roll as the same appears in the county treasurer's office for the year 1919.

John admits that he owns a house and lot worth \$50,000; mortgages worth half a million; watches and jewelry worth \$20,000; household goods worth \$15,000; musical instruments worth \$250; but when it comes to moneys, credits, bonds and stocks, the record is as follows:

Con admits that in 1919 he owned a house and lot worth \$43,500; and an automobile worth \$1,500; and had mortgages amounting to \$50,000; watches and jewelry worth \$1,000; and household goods worth \$5,000; but when it comes to moneys, credits, bonds and stocks, upon which he should pay taxes in Butte, if he is a resident of Butte, the record in the treasurer's office is as follows:

Thus it appears that while John and Con are one of us for political purposes, they are not one of us for the purposes of reporting their moneys, credits, bonds and stocks. They are not willing to carry their little joke about being residents of Butte so far as to pay taxes upon their "moneys, credits, bonds or stocks." Of course, we make these charges upon the assumption that Con and John actually have a few shares of stock in some corporation or other. We also assume that they actually have a few dollars in some bank, somewhere or other; and we also assume that they had a few dimes in their pockets. If they had any such stock or money on deposit or cash on hand, the same is taxable at their place of residence, and if they are residents of Butte they ought to have the decency to report such items of property for taxation in Butte. If they are not residents of Butte, they have no right to vote here. Is their registration fraudulent or their tax returns fraudulent, which? We ask the great lords to favor us with a personal reply.

How about your stock in Inspiration Copper? In Greene Can-

anea Copper? In International Smelting? In Hancock Copper? In the Guaranty Trust Company? In Cuba Cane Sugar? In Mesaba Iron Company? In Midvale Steel & Ordnance? In Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad?

And how about the \$31,000,000.00 that the Montana Power escaped taxation on through the corruption of your base tools, Secretary of State Stewart and Auditor George Porter?

Cause of Shutdowns

That the price of the red metal is the cause of the shutdowns and not the "reds," as alleged by the backers of the mongrel republican state and county tickets, is proven by the following chronological history of mine shutdowns by the Anaconda Copper Mining company since 1890:

Complete shutdown for seven months in 1891 on account of the low price of copper and trouble with the Montana Union Railway company over rates.

Complete shutdown commencing Christmas day, 1892, and ending in March, 1893, ostensibly on account of poor demand of copper.

Partial shutdowns in the years 1893 and 1894 on account of the low price of copper and silver.

Partial shutdown during part of the year 1903 on account of poor demand for copper.

Complete shutdown late in 1903 to force the governor of Montana to call an extraordinary session of the legislature to pass the so-called fair-trial law.

Partial shutdown in 1907 and 1908 on account of the poor demand for copper.

Partial shutdown in 1914 and 1915 on account of poor demand for copper following the advent of the World War.

Complete shutdown for three weeks in the fall of 1917 to force the miners and smelters to accept the company's unsatisfactory working conditions and scale of wages.

Partial shutdown since the armistice in November, 1918, on account of the poor demand for copper brought about by the dislocation of the world's industries during the war.

Next complete shutdown when it suits the purpose of the absentee directors of the company.

Business is the alternation of big booms and big slumps. There are sudden fortunes and there are great disasters. The working class gets all of the disasters and none of the fortunes. The mines shut down and the miners shut up.

It is a little pathetic to see the members of the Old Guard pretending that they are still alive.

WESTERN UNION MAKES BIG PROFITS

Government Makes a Farewell Present to This Corporation; "There's a Reason," It Is Said.

(By the Federated Press.)
New York, Oct. 23.—Editors of labor papers in the United States who worry about the size of their telegraph bills have been interested to note that "there's a reason." The Western Union Telegraph company, which controls 85 per cent of the telegraph service in the country, will pay its dividends twice over this year. In the first nine months of 1920, the company has made a net profit of \$10,198,000. This is equivalent to \$10.22 a share. The earnings are at a rate of about 15 per cent a year, or twice the dividend rate of 7 per cent. The government, in addition to turning back the Western Union wire in excellent condition, granted a 20 per cent increase in rates as a farewell gift, making possible the large earnings.
