WHEELER HURT IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Despite Fractured Ribs and Surgeon's Orders, Democratic Candidate Makes Address at Anaconda.

(Special to The Bulletin.)

Anaconda, Oct. 29.—Despite two fractured ribs, and a number of severe bruises sustained when an automobile in which he was riding went over the embankment at Flint creek hill between Phillipsburg and Anaconda yesterday afternoon, D. K. Wheeler ignored his surgeon's orders and delivered an address at the Margaret theater. He had been forbidden by the doctor to fill his speaking engagement.

The accident occurred while Mr. Wheeler and Senator J. W. Anderson of Richland county were being driven from Phillipsburg to Anaconda by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Michaud of Deer Lodge. At the point on Flint creek hill another car attempted to pass the Michaud car, which had been driven as close to the edge of the high embankment as was safe. The second car, however, held to the rut in the road and crashed into Michaud's car, hurling it over the embankment. According to Mr. Michaud, the car turned up three times in going down the hill. With the exception of Mr. Wheeler, none of the occupants of the car were hurt.

With the assistance of passing motorists, Mr. Wheeler was cared for. He was unconscious for 20 minutes. The car was not damaged, other than scratched. It was later detoured back onto the road and the journey into Anaconda resumed.

Learning of Mr. Wheeler's injury, the committee in charge of the arrangements at Anaconda immediately substituted other speakers and proceeded with the meeting. Mr. Wheeler, however, insisted on appearing and delivered a brief address.

The genuineness of the democratic gubernatorial candidate and his desire to keep his engagement despite his painful injuries, created a great impression among the huge crowd present. He was cheered and applauded generously.

ATTORNEY GRIFFIN TO SPEAK FOR WHEELER

Attorney Joseph H. Griffin, the well-known progressive republican of Butte, will deliver an address favoring the election of Burton K. Wheeler, democratic candidate for governor, at a rousing meeting to be held at Harrison, Mont., tomorrow (Saturday) night. Announcement of the securing of Mr. Griffin for this date was made this morning by the democratic campaign committee.

Lewistown, Mont., Oct. 29.—Before an audience of more than 1,200 people here last night, former Speaker of the House George L. Ramsey of Helena, unmercifully flayed United States Senator Henry L. Myers for what he called the senator's "traitorous desertion" of the democratic party, in which, he said, Myers had "been a salary-drawing office-holder for many years."

Ramsey ridiculed the statement that any "real democrats" in Montana were following the banner of the renegade United States senator and declared that to date "not a single active real democratic party man had followed Myers in his bolt and desertion."

He declared the chastisement that would be accorded Myers in next Tuesday's election would be more severe even than that landed him at the time of his previous desertion to the so-called independent democratic party.

A message from United States Senator Walsh expressing his regret at his inability to appear as one of the speakers at the meeting was read. The senator is confined to his home with a severe cold, contracted while making campaign speeches for Wheeler and the democratic ticket earlier.

"ROUSING RALLY" HELD BY G.O.P. SPEAKERS

A "rousing" republican rally was held last night at Community church, Floral park, in which it is declared every republican in the district participated. The whole 18 of them, including the imported quartet, and three speakers, were on hand. Spokane, Wash., Oct. 29. (Copyrighted by United Press).—The real issue in the present campaign is shall we have democracy in industry or shall we continue to drift in the direction that the Cummins-Esch bill and the Kansas industrial court plan would have us go.

Industry in America must either be autocratic or democratic. At the present time we see it growing more and more autocratic. The farmer-labor party demands that it be democratic.

In accomplishing the democratization of industry our process is to give workers, artisans and technicians increasing share in the responsibilities and management of industry.

I feel quite certain at this time we will carry enough western states to throw the election of the next president into the house of representatives. Then it depends on how many congressmen we have whether Christensen will be elected.

DAVIS-DALY CAGE FALLS; TWO ARE INJURED

Two men were injured this afternoon when a cage at the Colorado mine, owned by the Davis-Daly company, fell 200 feet in the shaft. Both men were rushed to Murray hospital where X-rays are now being made in an effort to ascertain the extent of their injuries.

The men are: MICHAEL LACY, WILLIAM MCKENZIE. Superficial examination at Murray hospital indicated that both men were injured about their feet. One was hurt rather badly, while it was believed the other was only slightly hurt.

Intimidation Being Used by A. C. M. to Compel its Help to Vote for G.O.P.

BRITISHERS SEIZE MACSWEENEY'S COFFIN

Fight Over Possession of Lord Mayor's Body Ensues When Authorities Stop Shipment to Dublin.

DEAD HUNGER STRIKER'S RELATIVES ARE INJURED

Greenwood's Agents Capture Casket and Put it on Special Packet Bound for Cork Instead of Capital.

 Dublin, Oct. 29.—Mourners for Terence MacSweeney arrived here without the casket with which they left London last night. Most of them were sleepless after the train and boat trip, broken by the scene at Holyhead when violence accompanied the seizure of MacSweeney's body by the British authorities. They presented a woe-begone appearance and several bore marks of the fighting over MacSweeney's casket.

Chief Secretary for Ireland, Sir Hamar Greenwood, served notice on the party at Crewes that the landing of the body at Dublin might lead to political demonstrations, therefore embarkation for there was not to be allowed.

When the police started to put the casket aboard a special packet to land the body at Cork, the mourners and the Sinn Fein body guard attempted to drive the police back, but none were armed and the police soon overpowered them.

The most seriously injured was Father Walsh, who was roughly handled when he attempted to keep the police from seizing the casket. Relatives refused to accompany the body which had been diverted from the planned trip to Dublin, where it was to lie in state today. Their plans for the funeral were not announced. They were angered and appeared scarcely to know what to do.

Chemist Declares Dawes Died of Grain Alcohol Poisoning and Not From Wood Alcohol As Supposed

Despite the testimony of physicians who performed the autopsy on the body of Harry W. Dawes of Livingston, that Dawes had died of wood alcohol poisoning as the result of drinking moonshine whiskey containing that poison, the coroner's jury which yesterday afternoon probed the case returned a verdict that Dawes' death was caused by drinking grain alcohol.

The jury's verdict was caused by the testimony of Dr. F. S. Easton, a registered chemist, who declared that from the testimony of the physicians as to their tests, the condition of Dawes' organs revealed an
