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LEAD IN TENNESSEE.

It is stated in a late "Geological Report of Tennessee" that this metal exists abundantly in this State, having been found in very many of the counties in the eastern division.

In Claiborne county numerous veins exist, and shafts have been sunk, and indications of the existence of the metal are found in Middle Tennessee.

In regard to a "large vein" in Davidson, in the vicinity of Haysborough, Dr. Taost, in his seventh report, says: "It is very probable that this vein is very extensive and rich, and the ore is good."

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OUR WAR AND SLAVERY IN ENGLAND.

The New York Express publishes the substance of a communication which has been addressed to that paper by a British resident of New York city.

The writer is Dr. C. Currier, a resident of New York city, and declares that the statements expressed by that pulpit declaimer truly reflect English opinion—even in anti-slavery circles.

Dr. Currier has been repeatedly asserted in England, that "the United States African slave trade" was not restoring to include the British mind with this idea.

His opinion is that England is not naturally inclined to observe a strict and honest neutrality. On the contrary, Mr. Currier asserts that prominent members of the House of Lords had declared that, if the United States were to declare emancipation to be the end and object of the war, she would have England for an ally.

By quotations from speeches of British peers are given to show the attitude of the British mind towards the slave trade, and the writer is of opinion that these quotations, in the following extract from a speech by Lord Brougham, are well known to give an accurate view of the anti-slavery cause as vigorous an impetus to late years as any man in England:

I regret to see that some persons propose to hold meetings in the north of England and elsewhere, having reference to slavery in America. I have been requested to attend one of these meetings to give the address of a president, not attend, nor countenance such assemblies, nor any of the kind held in the future.
