LOCAL DEFENSE.

An important element of the military strength of the country, in a contest like the present wherein the possessions, rights and liberties of all are dependent, it is not to be admitted, outside of the resources provided by the conscription law. We publish this evening a communication on this subject, which proposes an organization of this force, and to which we would direct attention.

The action of the Confederate Congress has already provided for an organization of the able-bodied non-combatants, to be associated to some extent with the regular army organization. Act No. 72 of the late session authorizes any number of persons, not less than twenty, who are not liable to military duty, to associate themselves as a military company for local defense.

THE NEXT FEDERAL CONGRESS.

The recent northern elections have determined, beyond question, the political complexion of the popular branch of the next Federal Congress. It will be democratic by a decisive majority, and the old organization, even within the northern States, will again be in position to dictate to its adversaries such political policy as it may determine upon.
