INSIDE VIEW OF THE SIEGE OF VICKSBURG.

By our Regular Correspondent. From about the 10th of May, we of Vicksburg have been looking on from the harbor of the Confederacy, by the intervention of communication with Jackson. Much apprehension was manifested, and many false reports were promulgated that the city was about to be abandoned.

On Wednesday morning, May 21st, the enemy's sharpshooters again opened a preliminary and random fire along the line of rifle pits. They remained at this position without making any advance, they merely waited until the enemy should attempt to charge the ditches, when a few well directed volleys would drive them back in their tracks.

Several orders were made to charge the line on the 21st, but the enemy's reply had a demoralizing influence upon the army, and toward their march began to falter, and they declined making any further advance.
