PLATFORM OF THE TENNESSEE DEMOCRACY.

1st. The Conservative men of Tennessee, putting aside all questions decided by the war, accept the title of 'Democrats' and form a united front with the Democratic party as it now exists.

2d. The question of the right of a State to secede from the Union has been decided by arms, and that decision should be accepted as final and conclusive.

3d. Nevertheless, while the Constitution makes the Federal Government supreme, it is so only within the limitations and powers over their domestic concerns, and making them equal in respect of such rights; and these rights have not been impaired by the result of the war, or the powers of the Federal Government augmented by it, to the endangerment of public liberty.

4th. The extinguishment of African Slavery is recognized as a fact, ratified by a binding Constitutional Amendment.

5th. The investiture of negroes with the right of suffrage, by the Constitution of the United States, and the disfranchisement of white men, by the same authority, is a gross usurpation of power, and a policy unjust, unwise and oppressive, and tending to excite a war of races: the white men of America are entitled to superiority and supremacy in the Government of the United States.

6th. The faith of the nation is pledged to the payment of the national debt, according to the terms of the laws under which the bonds were issued, and not otherwise. The time of payment of the bonds is not to be delayed, and the principal of the five-twenties ought to be paid in currency, and the money granted to the National banks to be withdrawn.

7th. The Government bonds should be taxed in the hands of the bondholders, equally with other property.

8th. The doctrine and practice of the Radical party, which endeavor, by encroaching upon the powers of the Executive and Judicial branches of Government, to absorb in the Legislative Department all powers, tend to the destruction of the Republican system of Government and the civil liberties of the people.

9th. Equal and exact justice to all men, of whatever State or persuasion, religion or political; peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations; entangling alliances with none; the support of the State Government in all its rights, as the most competent administration of our domestic concerns and the strictest adherence to the public securities; the preservation of the General Government in its whole constitutional vigor, as the sheet anchor of peace at home and safety abroad; the jealous care of the rights of election by the people and the supremacy of the civil over the military authority.

10th. Andrew Johnson the first choice of the Democracy of Tennessee; and their Delegates left free to write in selecting another as the candidate for the Presidency.

THE CONDEMNATION OF ONE VILLAIN.

We wonder at the shameless impudence with which a stump-baiting Congress of Radicals violates the plainest provisions of the Constitution and daily commences the rankest perjury. The super-eminent and unapproachable disregard for truth, honor and decency of a Butler whom his State delights to honor in proportion to his untruthfulness, is looked upon by us with the same kind of regard as the soldier who we respect some monster that a freak of nature has produced, to the end that there may be in the animal world something to typify such moral monsters as Butler and Stevens—two leoprous souls, if indeed they are souls, and not merely exhalations and puffs of mephitic vapor from the infernal pit.

We tried to profoundly reverence the law, and like Managers, holding an instantly vicious argument, and shamelessly false proposition to be a greater insult and provocation than a blow, are amazed to see a Boutwell and a Bingham, claiming to belong to the profession of which Erskine and Curran once were ornaments, in the days when it was not proscribed to the basest uses, reproducing before the American Senate the frothy ravings of the French revolutionaries against the most sacred principles of the law which all civilized men acknowledge as the cohesive attraction that binds society together.

We, remembering that the Romans were capable of generosity towards those who had rebelled against their lawful power, and that they honored those who had rebelled, in proportion to their heroism and endurance, and by these means their own glory, and did not base their hate upon the baseness of their bravado, we are amazed to see a people of so singularly sordid, base and grovelling a nature, that they find it a luxury to persecute and outrage and degrade those brave men whom they overwhelmed with numbers; confessing by arming a host of negroes that these were as brave and honorable soldiers as themselves, and that their German and other foreign mercenaries, with bounties and the promise of freedom, to help them conquer those of their own race and blood, whom they are, even now, not generous and manly enough to respect; but demand the trial of the President of the Southern Confederacy, whom they claimed and afterward held imprisoned for two years; whose conviction they would hail with jubilation acclamations; and whose execution half a million of them would attend if they could, to insult the martyr of the Southern struggle for independence, and bandy their sour jokes and ribald utterances while he was being choked to death, to the great glory of New England and the States that have issued from its loins.

There are a thousand acts of Radicalism at which we stare in stupefied amazement. It passes the conceivable as being as unexpectably base and mean and ignoble in little things as in matters of great concern.
