WASHINGTON, October 11.--The Internal Revenue Bureau has just issued regulations and instructions concerning the tax on distilled spirits, submitted to those of August last. No distiller's bond can be approved until his distillery warehouse has been provided with established under act of July 6th; and no distiller permitted to start until a stockkeeper has been appointed to such warehouse, before deduction will be made upon capacity tax or suspension until the required bond is given to the Assistant Assessor.
