CRIMINAL INTELLIGENCE.

Extensive Robbery. About Christmas time, the house of Mr. Robert B. May, who then lived in Bayou county, Mississippi, now a resident of Knowlton Landing, Arkansas, was entered, and a trunk opened and robbed of \$800, which every endeavor was made to recover the money and discover the thief, "hide no hair" of the missing treasure was never heard of until very recently. She alleged that he attempted to violate the person of his step-daughter, a beautiful, fragile girl, about thirteen years of age, as well as to seduce her. She was taken before Squire Black, on charge of attempted incestuous rape. Black sent the brute to jail, in default of \$3000 bail.

The Box Gang. A new species, and a most dangerous one to the industry, of confidence games, called the "box gang," has been reported from the rural districts here dropped small sums. The weekly review of the family market, as furnished by the Board of Marketmen, in this matter of chickens and turkeys generally, there has been, since last week, a slight advance, chickens being quoted at \$5 50/60 per doz, strange to say, notwithstanding the fact that the market is generally dull, though some of the dealers have come down to 45c per lb. (for single pound).

The following is the weekly review: WOODCOCKS, \$5 per doz; quails, \$3 per doz; venison, \$3 per lb. The supply is scarce of everything in this line except venison.

CHICKENS, \$1 25 per pair, \$5 00/60 per doz; turkeys, \$2 25 per pair, \$20 per doz; geese, \$1 each, 10 per doz; ducks, \$1 per pair, \$5 50/60 per doz.

MEAT, BUTTER AND EGGS. The prices at the stand for meat, butter and eggs are as follows: steaks, 15c; mutton chops, 20c; pork chops, 20c; sausage meat, 20c; corned beef, 12c; lard, 12c; butter, 15c; eggs, 15c per doz.

FISH AND OYSTERS. The following are the prices at the stand for fish and oysters: salmon, 15c; trout, 15c; white fish, 15c; codfish, 15c; haddock, 15c; turbot, 15c; oysters, 15c per doz.

FRUIT. The following will about be the average prices: Apples 25c per bushel; peaches 50c per bushel; honey, 50c per gallon.
