The Grand Jury of Jefferson county, Ga., found a true bill for murder on Tuesday last against Wilson Flournoy, a freed man, for the killing of Dr. Ayres, a radical member of the Legislature from that county. There was much feeling among the negroes in Jefferson against the accused, and the jail had been guarded by the whites to prevent a threatened lynching.

In our hasty review, yesterday, of the action of the Convention upon the Southern Pacific Railroad, we failed to make a point which we think will strengthen the position we have taken of antagonism to the report adopted. If we take the figures said to represent the distance between Memphis and San Diego, we find that only 2200 miles of railroad are necessary to bridge it. If we are guided by the declaration of the Convention, and the distribution of the energies of the Southern people upon the construction of branches from the Brazos river to New Orleans, Galveston, Vicksburg, St. Louis and Memphis, we will not only have to help construct the line from San Diego to that point, (about 1400 miles), but build 3000 miles of additional railway; thus reaching results that 2200 miles of road would give to the South by building 4400, or double the number. And for what?

To appease the clamors of towns and cities that are not upon the direct route, and that have claims only upon our sympathy as points of interest in the South. Just as we expected, and as we wrote on the 11th of February last, the only danger to be looked for to the El Paso, or the 31st parallel route, has been encountered through the Convention. On that day we stated that "the danger to be apprehended by the Memphis Pacific Railroad lay in the number of little rival interests which may spring, and that almost every neighborhood, and that members of Congress may be drawn off after other schemes. There can be no doubt as to the necessity of our standing together on the Memphis, Little Rock and El Paso route, which now combines the greatest strength and which is the only road that has any prospect of success."

The refusal of President Grant to permit a separate vote to be taken on the constitution clause of the Virginia Constitution has caused serious trouble in that State.
