THE NEW ORLEANS CONVENTION.

Reports in Favor of Iron Freight Barges, and in Favor of Cleaning the Mouth of the Mississippi.

FROM CAIRO.

CAIRO, May 26.—The following is the report for the past twenty-four hours, Richmond, from New Orleans to Louisville, 12 p.m.; Rubicon, from Vicksburg to St. Louis, 2 a.m.; Swallow, from Cincinnati to New Orleans, 3 p.m.; Thompson Dean, from New Orleans to St. Louis, 7 p.m. The river fell ten inches. Weather clear. Thermometer at noon 90°. The Swallow was well laden.

NEW ORLEANS, May 26.—The Convention assembled this morning, but the committee were unprepared to report, and adjourned after some important business. Reassembled at 3 p.m., when several committees presented reports. The Committee on Western Trade presented a communication, with resolutions, looking to the encouragement of employment of iron barges to transport freight on the Western River.

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JEWISH DIVORCE.

Interesting Ceremony.—The Jewish Rite of Divorce.

A ceremony, which has created no small amount of interest, was held on the 24th inst. at the residence of Mr. Burdette, for several weeks past, and was, on Thursday, consummated by a decree of divorce, pronounced by the rabbi, in the holy name of matrimony, and of the laws of the Jewish people.

FOR SOME TIME past the wedded relations of man and wife, existing between Mr. and Mrs. Burdette, have not been the most pleasant, and to relieve the unpleasantness of a mutual separation was agreed upon by the parties.

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RAILROAD INTELLIGENCE.

The contract for bridging the Alabama River for the South and North road has been let out to competent parties, who will at once go to work upon it. It is understood that the bridge will be located about three miles from Montgomery.

THE CONTRACT for completing the Missouri Valley Railroad from Savannah to Marysville, has been awarded to Phelps & Co., the same gentlemen who built the whole distance (300 miles) accomplished in four hours. There is no stopping for water, this being scooped up from troughs between the tracks while the train is running at full speed.

MR. DAWSON'S report of the Red river route has been laid before the Canadian department of Public Works, and the immediate consideration of a communication from the Superior to the Red river, at an estimated cost of \$250,000; the probable ultimate cost of a railroad and continuing navigation being put at \$5,000,000.

THERE HAS recently been some change in the arrangement of the officers of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Mr. J. Edgar Thompson is still at the head of the company. The Vice-Presidents have been increased to five, and are Col. T. A. Scott, H. J. Lombard, Edmund Smith, (Jail Secretary) and George B. Roberts. Joseph Lesley has been appointed Solicitor; Theodore Cuyler, General Counsel, and Maj. Firch is still acting as Treasurer.

IN A recent English work on the tensile strength of iron and steel, it is stated, as the result of an extended series of experiments, that for such iron as is usually employed for rails in France, Belgium and Wales, the breaking strain, as tested by sudden blows or shocks, is considerably influenced by cold. Such iron exhibits, at a degree Fahrenheit, only from one-tenth to one-fourth the strength which it possesses at eighty-four degrees.

THE CONCLUSION is drawn from these experiments that the only practical way to prevent railway accidents during severe frosts and winter weather is to slacken speed, or to give the rolling stock more elasticity by the employment of the India rubber springs.
