KOOAMANSCHAP. He is on His Way to Memphis—Will Attend the Louisville Convention—Is Prepared to Make Contracts for Chinese—Has the Promise of the Secretary of the Treasury that He will not be Interfered With. Washington, September 25.—A dispatch to the Louisville Courier-Journal says: Mr. C. Kooamanschap, who proposes to visit the Southern States for the purpose of entering into contracts to supply Chinese laborers, arrived here this morning from New York, and left this morning for Memphis, Tenn., and after making contracts there will visit New Orleans and other parts of the South. He will address the Commercial Convention meeting at Louisville on the 10th of next month, and leaves San Francisco on the 4th of November for China, to obtain laborers who will be contracted to furnish up to the time of his departure. Mr. Kooamanschap has a long and satisfactory interview with the President to-day on the subject of his rejection by the British Government as Consul at Glasgow.

CUBA. Spanish Reports Confirm Jordan's Defection. Havana, September 27.—The telegram sent from Havana Saturday, relative to the surrender of Gen. Jordan and his troops, upon payment by the Government of a certain sum of money, was based upon official dispatches from the neighborhood of Taguarama and Paria, and between Cienfuegos and Colon, are treating with authorities for their surrender of the rebel bands in their manufacturing, being treated to the sugar districts of Colon and Cardenas.
