The New York Herald defends General Butler in connection with the management of the National Academy for disabled soldiers.

The Pittsburgh Leader says: "The reaction taking place in the South in favor of the Democracy has caused a loss of interest in the freedmen among the Republicans of the North."

On the subject of Grant's special Ku-Klux message, maligning the South, the Gazette correspondent says: "This last effort will have no effect, it is thought in Democratic quarters, upon the country at large, at least name favorable to the dominant party, but will doubtless operate to the exclusion of many men elected by the Democratic party both to the Senate and House."

The game of the extreme Republican wing, just now seems to be to bring on a new process of reconstruction, and pitch up again the business in which, as politicians, they have heretofore so signally failed.

What the malignants may do, or be able to do, remains to be seen. But we think the chances are in favor of their receding from the pernicious legislation on which they seem now, with the President, to be leaning.

The Democrats have elected all their candidates in the organization of the Pennsylvania State, thus placing a check on the Radical majority in the House. Governor Geary's message, taking issue with the President in regard to the use of bayonets in State elections, has contributed largely to the demoralization of the Radical party.

The Rev. James Pike, who has been nominated by the Republicans for Governor of New Hampshire, is a Methodist preacher. He was elected a member of the Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth Congresses.
