SUMNER is expected to open his day in the Senate, on the subject of the outrages in the South. It is believed that he will have something to say to show that outrages are not confined to that quarter, but are to be found in some other high places, as well, both in Washington and at San Domingo. He has his anti-annexation resolutions before the Senate.

The House Ostrage Committee cannot agree to the proposition to give the President power to send out troops to suppress lawlessness without a previous call from the Governors of States. Butler is enraged at it, and shows all the natural animus of the beast. He has left Washington in disgust, and despairs of carrying out his Ku-Klux intentions.

The Columbus (Ohio) Crisis tells of a negro of that town, hitherto quite black, who is now almost completely turned white. The process has been going on a considerable time, and the amount of white in his complexion is more than the average of his white neighbors. This is rebellious in the face and eyes of the Thirteenth Amendment. What will be the fate of poor Cuffee when he gets down to a level with such "poor white trash" as the poor African?

Another Ku-Klux outrage has been committed in North Carolina for the benefit of the Ostrage Committee. The innocent Holden has been defamed, but Holden suffers lightly for his crimes. All honor to the Senate of North Carolina, which dared to render a true verdict and to do justice in the face of the Ku-Klux bill and threats from Washington. The day has now passed for regrets and tyrants to hold sway in this country. Freedom will breathe freer. They have rights, and these they will assert against snipers, despots, thieves and spoliators.

President Grant undertook a big job when he proposed to provide aid for all the Radical knaves driven from office by the Southern people. A few months since the defeat of a Radical was the passport to a foreign mission, or to a position of honor. But the demand is too great for the supply. The greater the rage and the more odious he is among the people he had persecuted and robbed, the greater the office he expects and appoints. So soon as Governor Holden was convicted of high crimes and impeached by the Legislature of North Carolina, he rushed to Washington, where he and Kirk and Berger, his confederates in crime are besieging the President to re-appoint and reward their loyal services.

When Seward rang his "little bell," and freemen were robbed of their property, imprisoned in dungeons, hounded and executed with no better authority, this immitable and pious people could see no wrong, and would not be moved even when they were told that the same people, their own continuing jailbreakers, bummers and carpet-baggers, with fire and sword, torch and leg-iron, were outraging and robbing thousands of their Southern fellow-citizens.
