WASHINGTON, April 22.—The Democratic Congress have just issued the following address: TO THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES. Our presence and official duties as members of the Executive branch of the Government have enabled us to become fully acquainted with the actions and designs of the Executive and the Radical Party, and we feel called upon to utter a few words of warning against the course which they have made toward the centralization of power in the hands of Congress and the Executive.

THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, has been formally nominated, and the declaration of his solid supporters have been echoed by a substantial majority of the Democratic and Conservative party of the Union, his or his able associates, as a means of subserving his personal ambition. When the SAD EXPERIENCE OF THE LAST TWO YEARS, so disappointing to the hopes and generous confidence of the people, was violent utterances and rash purposes of those who control the Executive.

GENEROUS CO-OPERATION, irrespective of all former differences of opinion, so that the harsh violence of the Executive, and the new and dangerous sectional agitation may be checked; that burdens of taxation, direct or indirect, may be laid upon the people with a just and equitable application, and with a strictly conservative spirit; that the Executive, and that States may be restored in their integrity, and true to the principles of the Constitution.

Under the pretext of passing laws to enforce the Fourteenth Amendment, and for other purposes, Congress has conferred the most despotic power upon the Executive, and provided an official machinery by which the liberties of the people are being trampled upon in the most systematic manner.

THE EXECUTIVE IN HISTORY, so often in history, they have established theories of our institutions; and the construction given by these Radical interpreters to the Fourteenth Amendment is, to use the language of an eminent Senator (Trumbull of Illinois), an "Annihilation of States."

OUR HOPES FOR THE FUTURE, our hopes for the future are in vain, good sense and sober second-thought of the American people. We call upon them to be true to their principles, and to insist on a decent respect for the rights of the citizen.
