The examination in the Cannon-Morse case was continued on Tuesday morning before Judge Winters, Elliott and Barker. The lawyers for the State were Colonel Van Anderson, Captain Fowler and Colonel Barker. The defense were Messrs. Sain and Bullock. The court room was crowded with spectators.
