EDMUND BURKE OF KNOX AND CALHOUN. No political leader has made better general observations on the evils which popular governments are subject to during revolutionary periods than Edmund Burke. Living during the storm which the French revolution gave to opinions and institutions, his observation confirmed much that he had learned from the study of the past, or illustrated, while they modified, opinions formed in the contemplation of the study which he had given to politics. One of the great evils of disturbed and revolutionary times, as he observed them, was the tendency of men to give their active in combination for the most selfish purposes. He has expressed so much, by way of description of a class always dangerous in disturbed times, that we cannot but be struck by the truth of his observations. He has written to our readers, who will be at once so descriptive in it of a class making position in the wild times which we live. Burke warns the people that "these times or state of men who have got together, avowedly without any public principle, in order to sell their joint property at the highest rate, and, therefore, mutually odious, ought never to be suffered to combine in the State, because they have no connection with the sentiments and opinions of the people."
