ST. LOUIS, JANUARY 22.—The annual

meeting of the District Grand Lodge No. 2 Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, or "Sons of the Covenant," commenced here yesterday.

THE STATE AUDITOR'S REPORT,

recently presented to the legislature of Mississippi, shows that there is no money in the treasury; that the State's indebtedness, on account of the ordinary expenses of the government, had increased about \$7,000,000 in two years; that the expenditures the present year had exceeded the receipts \$800,000, and were largely in excess of the estimates, and this, under a load of taxation five times heavier than the people ever felt before, and a delinquent treasury, with no prospect of replenishment. And yet, a Jackson Clarion, the railroad ring is largely represented at the capital, and the horse-leech cry of "give, give," is heard on every hand, the Democrats solidly opposing while the Radicals are a unit in the case of the proposed repeal of the railroad subsidy bill for all appropriations of public credit and money.

GOVERNOR BROWN HAS ACCEPTED
