SPAIN.

MADRID, April 10.—Advice from Catalonia state that the Alameda of Greece had been arrested by a band of Carlists, but was quickly released. Troops are still pouring into the province of Gerona, and have captured four prisoners. Dispatches from the province of Old Castile state that the Carlists have attacked the municipality of Agreda, and gaining an entrance, seized and carried off the result of the votes at the recent election.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, April 10.—The claimant to the throne of Spain, Don Carlos, is reported to have been arrested by the government at San Sebastian, and sent there for detention. He has also been reported to have been taken to the interior of the country, and is now being held in a secret place.

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WEST VIRGINIA.

CHARLESTON, April 10.—The Constitutional Convention at Charleston, West Virginia, adjourned yesterday. The constitution passed in its final reading by a vote of 100 yeas and 10 nays. The constitution is a masterpiece of wisdom and statesmanship, and is the result of a long and arduous struggle.

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THE CONTACT.

A dispatch from Washington states that there was a conference held there yesterday, in which Democrats and Republicans consulted freely as to the candidates of the coalition party, and as to the terms of cooperation between the two parties. The former insisting that the ticket must be wholly Republican. Finally the Democrats agreed to accept David Davis and Governor Curtin, and this ticket, it was agreed, would be the ticket.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Meeting of the Republican State Convention. NEW ORLEANS, April 10.—The Colored Men's National Convention met in the hall of the House of Representatives at Mechanics Institute, at noon, and adjourned until 10 o'clock. A. R. Rouse, of South Carolina, who read the resolutions of the Colored Men's National Convention, held last year at Charleston, under which the present convention was called. He declared that the colored people of this country are in a state of peril, and that it is the duty of the white people to rise to their rescue.

ILLINOIS.

Political Affairs—Liberal Republicans Gaining Strength. SPRINGFIELD, April 10.—There is a good deal of excitement in political circles at the State capital, and reports from all parts of the State indicate that the Liberal Republican movement is gaining considerable strength. Among the names to the list of independent candidates are those of Governor Briggs, and others who are well known in the State.

WASHINGTON GOSSIP.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—The House Appropriations Committee this morning agreed to recommend the appropriation asked for by the agricultural department—about forty thousand dollars. The Secretary of the Treasury transmitted a bill to the House to-day, with reference to the sale of the land in the Presidential election, but Massachusetts may next be sacrificed and silenced.

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TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

Gambetta arrived at Brest yesterday. No extraordinary fresh is expected in the Ohio river. The invasion in Jersey are not so great as first reported. Newark, New Jersey, elected a Radical Mayor yesterday. A little is mentioned in Mexico, as far as the victory of Matamoros. Gortschakoff succeeds Giers as Minister to Switzerland, from Russia. Claims were made in the Senate yesterday. The Republicans of Pennsylvania are holding their convention at Harrisburg. The Democrats of the State are holding their resolutions of confidence in Thiers. Late telegrams from Albany, New York, announce the election of Chamberlain for Mayor. The House discussed the Franking Privilege yesterday but did nothing, and never will do anything. In the Ohio Legislature, yesterday, a bill was passed for the proper ventilation and general regulation of coal mines. Forty-seven thousand women have petitioned Bismarck to exempt them from military duty for five years. The house of W. T. Cogswell was burglarized last night, and Mr. Cogswell was severely wounded. He is now recovering from his wounds. A London dispatch says that Messager, a forty-year old Frenchman, was killed by a train on the Northampton road on Monday last over the Northampton coast. The parent of a child in New York has used the Health Department of that city for forced vaccination of the child, charging first, second and third, and second, the introduction of scrofula into its system. The deeds for the sale of the Trinity College grounds to the city of Hartford, Connecticut, for six hundred thousand dollars, have been made out. The college also gives bonds to commence new college buildings within the city limits within five years. The Franklin Commonwealth, the leading Republican journal of Kentucky, will suspend publication next week. The paper has been published since the day of its giving up the ghost now indicates that Republicanism in Kentucky has a very feeble and failing foothold. Judges Cardozo and Barnard have been convicted by the citizens' investigating committee of all sorts of villainous and private citizens have been robbed and wronged by these already wicked villains. It is expected that some very important work will be done by this organization. The New York World also says that many of the leading Republicans of New York—among others, Messrs. O'Brien, and others—are reported to have expressed their intention of attending the Cincinnati Convention.

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
