CONGRESSIONAL NOTES.
IN THE SENATE.
Senator Wheeler today made up the bill proposing distinction on account of race color in the public schools of the United States.
On motion of Senator Sawyer the bill providing that the next Federal election in Louisiana be held on the first Monday in November, the same day as the State election, was taken up.
Senator Trumbull opposed the bill as setting a bad precedent, which might be used for political purposes.
At the expiration of his term, the postoffice appropriation bill came up for consideration, the pending question being the amendment increasing the subsidy fee mail service to Brazil to four hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and providing for semi-monthly service.

An amendment by Senator Ferry, reducing the amount to three hundred thousand dollars, was adopted.
Senator Wheeler moved that the service be performed for three years, and had leave to withdraw all the amendments offered.
The bill was then passed, and the House adjourned.
The amendment appropriating five million four hundred and forty-nine dollars for the postoffice deficiency was taken up.

IN THE HOUSE.
Many bills of no general interest were in the hands of the Speaker, but many of the morning hour, which had been devoted to action on Mr. Trumbull's bill, were taken up.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.
A Deceased Man has Rescued to a Pistol to End his Troubles.

NIBLO'S THEATER BURNED.
The Scourge of "Black Friars" No More—Purified by Fire.
All the Effects of Lallah Book in Ashes—Dispersion of the Bandits.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The fire at Niblo's Theater this morning gained such headway before it was discovered that the general alarm was sounded, bringing out the entire fire department. A crowd of police were placed around the theater, and the fire was kept from spreading to the adjacent streets. The book and lumber stores commenced burning down the interior blocks, but were driven out by the intense heat. The theater was entirely destroyed. The Metropolitan Hotel caught fire, causing a stampede among the guests and employees. The fire in Niblo's theater was caused by a gas lamp which had been left burning. The fire spread rapidly, and the theater was completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at one hundred thousand dollars.

ATTEMPTED MURDER.
The office where the catastrophe occurred is in the room of the late Justice Moore. The magistrates of Memphis are remarkable for their judicial courage and official promptitude, and of course Justice Moore is no exception. Having heard the explosion of the village, he immediately proceeded to the scene of the crime, and found the body of the deceased man lying on the ground. He immediately ordered the coroner to hold an inquest, and the coroner accordingly did so. The inquest was held this morning, and the jury returned a verdict of natural death.
