Little Rock, November 14.—Quite a sensation was created this evening by the issuance of a proclamation from the Republican office, by V. V. Smith, late lieutenant-governor under Baxter, declaring himself governor. The proclamation sets forth that during the absence of the lieutenant-governor, Elisha Baxter abandoned the office of governor and turned the same over to one A. H. Garland. The abdication and abandonment of the executive office, the lieutenant-governor says, amounts to a partial or constructive resignation by Baxter at least; if that be true, the office of governor is vacant, there being no legal occupant in possession of the same. Under this state of circumstances, the lieutenant-governor says he assumes the duties of governor.
