GLANVILLE will not resume the leadership of the Liberal party of England. A telegram from London yesterday says he has given his family positive assurance to that effect.

HON. ALEXANDER H. STEPHENS, of Georgia, has we are glad to say, so far recovered as to afford reasonable assurance of his ability to fill his lecture engagements in Chicago and elsewhere.

THE complete vote in Connecticut on the amendment changing the time for holding the elections, etc., was: For, 41,120; against, 27,670. On the second amendment, empowering the legislature to restore forfeited electoral privileges, the vote was: For, 31,599; against, 11,283.

THE secretary of the State of California has received the official returns of the State for governor at the late election, and it appears that the correct result are as follows: Phelps, R-publican, 31,322; Irwin, Democrat, 61,609; Bidwell, Independent, 29,752; Lovett, Prohibition, 356.

THE Herald publishes some evidence to show that when Henry Clives & Co. were appointed bankers for the government in Europe, "Mr. Boutwell thought it a great mistake, and his opinion was overruled by the only officer who had authority to control him." The fact, adds the Herald, that the appointment was procured by corrupt means, "puts the high officer who enforced it in a most unenviable light." This high officer, says the New York Sun, was President Grant; and the corrupt means consisted in the payment of a large sum of money to his brother-in-law, whose influence at the White House was constant, and who was known to have also obtained money from the sale of appointments.

ELSEWHERE we publish a short sketch of Wm. M. C. Kerr, the prominent western candidate for the speaker of the house, in regard to whom somebody started the rumor that he had felt it to be his duty to sacrifice his chances for the speakership for G. verner Hendricks, with a view of strengthening the latter in the Presidential contest. This can now be positively denied, as Mr. Kerr has written a letter to a friend in which he states that there is not a word of truth in the rumor that Governor Hendricks does not, nor would he ask, such a sacrifice of him. He declares himself a candidate in good faith, with no intention of giving up the contest until his party makes its nomination in caucus or otherwise.

THE full term of the United States supreme court commenced on Monday. The docket is unusually large, embracing six hundred and sixty-six cases. Among the leading cases which will occupy the court are those presented by the railroad of Illinois, Wisconsin, and Minnesota, arising out of the railroad contracts in those States, and involving the constitutional right of the States to regulate rates for passengers and freight. The validity of the enforcement act will be decided early in the session of the court. This case was elaborately argued at the last term and set over.

THE validity of the act of the California legislature prohibiting the immigration of Chinese women who may be suspected of being brought here for immoral purposes will also be argued this term. The claim is made that a State has no legal right to inquire into the morals of immigrants.

WE learn from the New York Sun that the adherents of the republic of Cuba celebrated, on the tenth instant, the seventh anniversary of its declaration of independence, and we can well imagine how the day was hailed by the gallant determined, and much suffering patriots in the field, as well as by those in the forests of the island. Not only the soldiers of the liberating army of Cuba but the whole native population of the island have for seven years endured trials and hardships in behalf of their country, not only suffering by far those experienced by any and all other American colonies in their respective wars of independence, but of such a nature that they have deservedly called down upon the head of their enemy the anathemas of the civilized world. And still these hardships continue, and are likely to, unless the great powers of Europe, together with the United States, shall, in the interests of civilization, interfere to prevent them.

WE publish this morning, from the Cincinnati Commercial, a Washington special, which gives in full the charges of Messrs. Harris, Wells and Pease, against Ames, of Mississippi, in which they denounce him and his administration without stint. They assert, as the APPEAL has many times published, that Ames has staked to build up a personal party that would elect him to the United States senate, and to this end he has not only pardoned felons out of the penitentiary to run for the legislature, and procured the selection of other notorious criminals as candidates, but he has likewise used his utmost exertions to inaugurate a war of races. But the decent negroes of his own party have become disgusted, and are deserting him in crowds. Rev. J. E. Johnson, an influential colored Methodist clergyman of Jackson, has recently published a letter advising the colored people to cut loose from their league and join with the white men in redeeming the State from the spoiler, and the National Democrat declares that the approaching convention will probably result in the choice of a Conservative legislature, to which end every man, whether white
