CALLING A HALT.

Boutwell's proposition to reconstruct the Southern States found a champion in Senator Stephen A. Aikin, of Alabama. On Tuesday last he introduced a resolution for the appointment of a committee to investigate the recent elections in Alabama, because the State had voted Democratic by a fifty-thousand majority.

Mr. Boutwell must be very obtuse if he has not already discovered his mistake. He has yet to see the first Republican publican that has any claim to character and influence which does not repudiate the recommendations as in effect a confession of the weakness of reconstruction and the assertion of a principle whose recognition would revolutionize the Federal government and reduce the rights of the States to a nullity.

Such radicals as Boutwell forget that this is the Centennial year. While patriots are invoking peace and reconciliation, and honestly desire a forgetfulness of sectional hatreds and the union of a people in a common brotherhood for the promotion of the best interests of the country, Boutwell, the leader of the Republicans in the Senate, demands that the south be "reconstructed to a territorial condition" and reconstructed upon a new basis; in a word, upon a basis which will force the southern States to vote the Radical ticket before they can be considered "truly loyal!"

The Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune, judging from the growth of public opinion in all sections of the country, is of the opinion that should the price of silver remain until next winter as low as at present, or if the rise should not bring it above greenbacks in market value, the indications are that the sentiment of the people, under the lead of the prominent advocates of the recoinaction of silver, will be so strong as to make the passage of a bill ordering the coining of legal-tender silver dollars one of the first acts of congress next winter.

Even Brownlow admits that Isham G. Harris is the ablest man in the Democratic party in Tennessee. But he is not only that—we know him to be one of the most conservative. Combining ability with conservatism, Harris is just the man we want to represent Tennessee in the United States senate.
