THE RUSSO-TURKISH WAR.

Our Government Formally Notified that a State of War Exists between Russia and Turkey—The Cabinet not yet Decided upon a Neutrality Proclamation.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—Minister Shikin called upon the secretary of state this evening, and gave an official notification to the government of the United States that a state of war exists between Russia and Turkey. Secretary Exvarts will probably make the Russian matter a subject of discussion tomorrow, whether a neutrality proclamation will be issued by our government.
