At the Shelby county circuit court, yesterday, the case of League & Fisher vs. the city was decided, the jury returning a verdict in favor of the city, and awarding ten dollars, for rent of the Causey street police-stationhouse some years since.

A religious and patriotic meeting will be celebrated this morning, at nine o'clock, for the repose of the late holy father, the pope, at St. Mary's church. The Rev. Father Grogan, pastor of the church, will deliver the address.

On Sunday crowds of people visited the city and enjoyed the view of the river and the Arkansas state. Numbers of citizens visited Court square, Elmwood cemetery, and other points of local interest. The weather was clear and bright, and a large number of people were present.

The Athens manufacturing company commenced a suit for five thousand dollars against the city, yesterday, before the Shelby county circuit court. The suit is for the payment of money due the Athens company for a steam fire-engine purchased by the city.
