The good impression created by the news of the journey of Count Schouvaloff to St. Petersburg, is strengthened by the fact that he had long intervened with Lord Salisbury, foreign secretary, and Lord Beaconsfield, premier, before his departure.

It is believed that he takes the Russian and British from Constantinople, and the facilitating of the assembling of the congress, Count Schouvaloff will arrive in St. Petersburg, Saturday, and is expected here in two weeks.
