WASHINGTON, July 6.—A Portland dispatch says that the new Dallas station which James Clark and a party of fourteen men were out last Sunday on a hunting expedition on the south fork of the John Day river, and when about twelve miles from its mouth, at Murdock's camp, they came upon a band of Indians, supposed to be about four hundred strong, who endeavored to cut off the line of retreat of Clark's party, and nearly succeeded in the attempt. The whites defended themselves; one man was killed and two others were seriously wounded before the command made its escape. Clark and two of his men were cut off by the Indians, and the remainder of the party, including Clark, were rescued by a party of twelve men who were on the war-path.
