WASHINGTON, March 24.—A careful canvass among the leaders of both wings of the Democracy justifies the prediction that a spirit of mutual concession will prevail to-morrow night's caucus.

Speaker Carlisle said to the APPEAL correspondent to-night: "The tariff reformer will insist upon an emphatic demand for tariff reform as the formal expression of the Democratic party, but there is no party who cannot concede to the tariff reformer the danger of a division has passed."

Casey Young believes that the caucus will be agreed upon some harmonious plan.

Representative Caldwell, of Tennessee, does not think the caucus will take any extreme action. He believes that differences will be harmonized.

Mr. Morrison said to-night: "There will be no trouble. There will be a few hot heads in the caucus, but we will control them. We do not propose to let anybody out of the party because they do not subscribe to tariff reform."
