

THE EXPOSITION.

The Chattanooga City Exhibit—The Display of Missouri—Hints to Persons Intending to Pay

New Orleans a Visit—How to Secure Cheap and Comfortable Accommodations—French Boarding-Houses.

When this foggy weather comes upon strangers generally slam down their windows to keep the moisture out, and are astonished when they find walls get wet and moist, and the atmosphere become very damp.

In securing a comfortable room in New Orleans the great point is to get a room on the first or second floor, and a wooden house, not a brick or stone one. In this climate the latter are always moist and damp, and are very disagreeable.

It has been announced for some time past that the Missouri exhibit was on its way here, and that it was a very large one. It arrived this week, and was installed in a couple of hours, but not at all to the satisfaction of the Missouri commissioners or to the public.

The winter season has now set in throughout the Exposition, and as a consequence, travel has already begun in this direction. The arrivals of the few weeks past, especially from the neighboring States, Mississippi and Alabama, contributing the most to the increase of the number of visitors.

There is no lack of accommodation for visitors now, and there is so much competition in the business, so many engaged in it, that it is not likely to be crowded throughout the winter.

The Boarding-Houses of New Orleans, like those of other cities, vary from the fashionable and expensive to the cheap and dirty. You are never to be misled, unless it has been recommended by a resident of New Orleans who knows something about the city.

The Exposition management, last year, organized a department styled the Bureau of Information and Accommodation, for the receipt and care of visitors, which has been continued this year by the present management.

There is a large number of rooms for rent in the city, with or without board, arranged according to the prices charged by the day, week or month, and also furnished with immense maps of the city, showing the location of each of these rooms, so that the visitor can see just where and how he is located.
