Small Percentage of Fatalities Due to Modern High Velocity Steel Jacketed Bullets Used by Germans.

The humane character of the modern high velocity steel jacketed bullet used by the Germans is shown in the wounds of the British soldiers, the majority of the injuries being of such a character as to merely make the man temporarily helpless as a soldier without permanently crippling him.



SENATORS FIGHT ALL NIGHT OVER "PORK BAR" BILL

Burton Leads Filibuster and Continuous Session Is Held. Contest Becomes One of Physical Endurance.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—In a finish fight on the stivers and pork barrel appropriation bill, Democrats held the Senate in session all night last night in a vain effort to break the Republican filibuster of opposition.

When day dawned on the Capitol dome an unusual scene was presented in the chamber. A half dozen heavy-eyed, weary Senators were the principal actors, and the floor was littered with papers and debris of every sort.

And still Burton talked on. Weary and haggard this morning, Burton promised to be able to continue indefinitely. He declared he would "drop in his tracks" before he would surrender his fight.

Democratic Senators took "shifts" in presiding. They "spelled" each other as president of the Senate, working in relays to avoid fatigue.

REMINDER OF FAMOUS FILIBUSTER

The all-night filibuster was the first continuous night session since the "justification" resolution last spring when the Mexican situation was before the Senate.

A compromise was in sight early today. Burton will accept a reduction of the \$15,000,000 bill to \$20,000,000 if the latter is made in a lump sum for expenditure only on continuing projects without authorization of new work.
