FEAR STEFANSSON AND COMPANIONS ARE LOST IN ARCTIC

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—A special dispatch to the New York Times from R. M. Anderson, of the Canadian Arctic Expedition, dated Baillie Island, N. W. T., August 21, via Nome, Alaska, September 22, says Vilhjalms Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, and his two companions, Vorkoren and Ole Anderson, have not been heard from since the supporting party returned from Iceland early last April.

MRS. MAURY I. DIGGS BEGINS DIVORCE SUIT

Wife of Californian Cites Two Escapades in Action.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 22.—Mrs. Maury I. Diggs' suit for divorce came up in the Superior Court today. Her petition cites two escapades with women in which one charges that her husband, a prominent California politician, was involved.

The first of these was the notorious case in which Marsha Warrington, F. Drew Caimetti and Lola Norris figured out Diggs, resulting in the prosecution of Diggs and Caimetti on charges of violating the Mann white-slave law, in convictions and in sentencing of the two young men to terms in the penitentiary, not yet enforced on account of pending appeals.

The second was an incident in which the names of Diggs and several men companions were linked with that of Ida Peering. They were tried on accusations of offenses against a minor, but basing their defense, not only on denials of the girl's charges, but on the ground that the second Peering was acquitted.

BRITISH CAPTURE GERMAN SUPPLIES IN NORTH ATLANTIC

Reconverted Liner Spreewald and Two Colliers Make Seizures 92.

LONDON, Sept. 22.—The Hamburg-American liner Spreewald has been captured by the British cruiser Berwick, Captain Lewis C. Baker, in the North Atlantic, the Admiralty announced tonight. Two colliers also were captured.

The Spreewald was fitted out as an armed cruiser. The two colliers carried 200 tons of coal and 180 tons of provisions for the German cruisers in Atlantic waters.
