

THE DUKE'S ENTERPRISE TO FILM HOLY LAND RESULTS IN FAILURE

Creditors Seize Expensive Furniture of Manchester's \$10,000,000 "Movie" Concern.

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—The Duke of Manchester's entry into the motion picture business ended in disaster yesterday when creditors seized the effects of the elaborately furnished offices of the International Social Service League, 10 West 11th street.

The concern was organized by the Duke in June with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. By absorbing the Church and School Social Service Bureau, of which the Rev. Dr. William Carter, one time pastor of the Madison Avenue Reformed church, is head, he intended to furnish moving pictures on religious subjects to churches, schools and theological organizations.

Unfortunately, as Dr. Carter explained yesterday, the war, economic conditions and the failure of the Duke's friends to raise stock, doomed the scheme to failure.

In many respects the Western trip, which has just ended here at Los Angeles, has been the most illuminating of the series. Here in the Far West the picture has been clear-cut and almost unambiguous. And out of all the mass of conflicting testimony, charges and counter charges, stands out one inexorable fact: All of the agencies of industrial control set up by man, looking to the accomplishment of justice in industrial matters, have in one place or another broken down.

BOTH SIDES DISSATISFIED.

In Butte the commission found a closed shop and unions strong enough and well enough organized to adjust grievances in a manner satisfactory to the workers and to secure a constantly increasing share of the fruits of production. But here, too, the commission found dissatisfaction and ill feeling. There were evidences of an abuse of power by some of the unions. There was bitter dissatisfaction among some of the employers in San Francisco, who found themselves confronted by unions so strong that the usual course of labor controversy was utterly reversed, and employers actually came before the commission and stated that their grievances against organized labor were such that they were not permitted to bargain collectively.

MUCH SEASONAL EMPLOYMENT.

Throughout the Pacific coast, regardless of organized labor or the open shop, is found seasonal employment, men working at top speed in the orchards and vineyards and held fields during one season of the year, and crowding into the cities, idle and often penniless and hungry, at the other period of the year. It found that on the shoulders of these itinerant, unskilled laborers rested the basic prosperity of the Pacific Coast States. Without them the industries that have made the coast in a business way would fall, and yet no constructive efforts have so far been made, no far-reaching plan has been developed, looking to solution of the problem of seasonal unemployment.

They found growing wild there 25 annual species of the plant having different flowers, which differed somewhat from the European species, the name of the alfalfa being superior to it, and had never been cultivated by the Indians.

CITY TO FURNISH HOUSES
