

ITALY HOLDS FIRM IN NEUTRAL POLICY; WAITS ON TURKEY

Overt Acts by Porte Will Mean Rupture of Triple Alliance as Mobilized Army Joins Allies.

GENEVA, Sept. 28. The possibility that Italy will break its neutrality policy and enter the war on the side of the Allies has been depressed by the apparent effect of the Greek-Italian-Italian alliance on Turkey's belligerent intentions, say dispatches from Rome.
