

ATTORNEY ACCUSES "MET" RAILWAY IN \$300,000 SUIT

Charges Perjury in Awarding Payment of \$5000 Damages to Child and in Procuring His Disbarment.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Benjamin Oppenheim, a lawyer, announced today that he had brought suit for \$300,000 damages against the Metropolitan Street Railway Company.

Back of the announcement lies an amazing charge of how, for 18 years, the street railway company sought by legal tricks and the bribery of witnesses to avoid the payment of a judgment for \$5000 to a little girl crippled for life in a street car accident.

After 17 years' struggle, Oppenheim has obtained his reinstatement at the bar and also a court order directing the company to pay Harriet Nugent, his crippled client, the \$5000 with accumulated interest, a total of \$14,000.

The company is now bankrupt and in the hands of a receiver, Douglas Robinson, who has refused to pay the \$14,000 to Miss Nugent.

Miss Nugent was struck by a street car when she was 8 years old and one of her legs was amputated. She is an orphan and was recently found in a Brooklyn street delirious from hunger and exposure.

After the verdict in the damage suit, it is alleged, the company sent agents out to get the witnesses to change their testimony. The mother of one girl witness, it is charged, paid \$250.

The next step, according to the lawyer, was to "get" Oppenheim. Through witnesses, whom he says were paid by the company, the Nugent verdict was set aside and Oppenheim disbarred.

DEACONS CALLED PARASITES University Head Tells Baptists Church Officers Throttle Ministers.

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 27.—Church deacons furnish the most serious problem to be faced today, particularly in the Baptist denomination, according to Dean Shiller Matthews, of the University of Chicago, in an address before the convention in session here.

"They are moral parasites who throttle the work of the minister," he declared. "Many of them," he added, "are nothing more than moral thermos bottles or fiesha-cookers, because they show religious fire only occasionally, and then only when they find things already heated."

U. S. HEEDS JAPAN REQUEST ABOUT GRIER AT HONOLULU Will Order German Warship Out If Found Seaworthy.

Steps to comply with the Japanese request were taken by Government officials today. Honolulu port authorities were ordered to report whether the Geler is now seaworthy.

Forty-four years ago today Marshal Bazaine surrendered the fortress of Metz and the French army of the Rhine to Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia.

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
