




CAPT. L. S. RYAN DIRECTS GUN PRACTICE
Standing on a wind-swept knoll he marked down the wooden victims.




FIRING ONE OF UNCLE SAM'S NEW GUNS, RIVALS OF GERMAN "BUSY BERTHAS"
