THE BRITISH AT THE FRONT—ARTILLERY ON THE MOVE

A battery is shown on the way to a new position in Belgium. These are some of the heavy field pieces that have held the Kaiser's forces at bay in their desperate attempt to break through the extreme left of the Allies' line. Eight horses, and sometimes twice that number, are required to drag these heavy guns through the miry roads. British troops are shown breaking camp in the background, only one tent remaining standing where many had been pitched. Ammunition and baggage wagons are preparing to follow the guns in their advance to a new point of vantage won for them by a desperate charge of British infantrymen. Villagers are seen standing about watching with great interest the preparations of their defenders.

A scene outside Dixmude, in Belgium. The French Colonials have been ordered forward after a French battery has silenced the German guns. The men are leaping out of their trench and are about to follow their officer (facing them), in a charge on a body of German infantrymen guarding the retreat of their vanquished field pieces. The charge follows an all-day battle in which several German charges were repulsed with very heavy loss.
