ALLIES REPULSE ATTACKS  
BY GERMAN INFANTRYMEN

PARIS, Nov. 27.—Repulse of German infantry attacks on the right bank of the Yser in Belgium and in the Argonne region of France is announced in an official communique issued here this afternoon. The bombardment of Rheims continues, and the fighting in the Argonne region is apparently severe, as some trenches there have been taken and retaken by the opposing forces.

THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT.  
During the day of November 26 the shelling of the enemy's artillery was constant everywhere. Two attacks by infantry directed against the bridges which we have thrown upon the right bank of the Yser to the south of Dinant were sharply repulsed. There were no fighting on the rest of the front in Belgium and as far as the Oise. The same can be said of the situation on the Aisne and in the champagne district.

HEADQUARTERS MEXICATED.  
Field headquarters of the German general commanding the right centre are being menaced by the French artillery, so close have the Allies been able to push their lines to the positions of the Germans. These headquarters are located near Laon upon a high eminence that commands the surrounding country.

The Germans are reported to be shipping many bateaux into the region of Dixmude in West Flanders for the obvious purpose of using them for the transportation of troops across the inundated district. This would prove a most hazardous undertaking, for the western

neighborhood of Liege has been forbidden to travel, because the tracks on the trains is required for the soldiers and marines and for ammunition and provisions.

On the other hand, a news agency dispatch from Northern France says, "Circumstantial reports are current that the Germans are retiring in West Flanders." The dispatch also says that Canada can be retaken by the Allies any time they care to occupy it.

The bombardment of the Belgian coast had satisfactory results. Our troops have cautiously pushed forward as far as the outskirts of Ostend, encountering only small detachments of the enemy. If covered by the guns of our warships, they could recapture Ostend any time. The destruction of Zeebrugge and the other German defenses on the Belgian coast given once more occasion for demonstration of British naval supremacy.

Switzerland.

TURK SUBMARINE  
IN HARBOR ATTACK  
SUNK BY RUSSIANS

Attempt to Raid Warships in Port at Sebastopol Reported Failed—One Victim Claimed by Gunfire.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 27.—Two Turkish submarines that tried to enter the harbor of Sebastopol to attack the Russian warships were discovered and fired upon last night. One is reported to have been struck by the Russian gunners and sunk. The two vessels are believed to be part of those sent to Turkey by Germany.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 27.—Success is reported from the snow-covered plateau of Armenia, where the attempted Turkish advance has been checked. In the center the Turks have been driven back to their positions at Devenbolice and Erzerum, while failure has also attended the clumsy experiments in turning movements made by the Turks at German instigation on the Russian left near the Persian frontier and the Russian right near Batum.

The possibility of a further energetic offensive by the Turks in this region seems excluded, especially as the British occupation of Basra will prevent the withdrawal of any large body of troops from Mesopotamia for the purposes of reinforcement in Asia Minor.

RUSSIANS IN SERBIA  
BEATEN BY AUSTRIANS  
Advance in Serb Territory Progresses, Vienna Says.


VIENNA, Nov. 27.—Russian forces have been sent to reinforce the Serbians, but the operations of the Austrian troops in Serb territory continue to be successful, according to an official report from the General Staff. It follows:

"In Serbia our operations proceeded successfully. The enemy is worn out by our heavy attacks and Russian troops now fighting with the Serbians have had to fall back with them."

"South of the river Lijg we captured the eastern heights and took 300 Russian prisoners. From Valjevo we have advanced in the direction of Kosogevic, 19 miles south of Valjevo."

9000 TURKS TAKEN  
AS RUSSIANS DRIVE  
TOWARD ERZERUM

Complete Rout of Sultan's Forces in Armenian Campaign, Announced by Petrograd.

TIFLIS, Transcaucasia, Nov. 27.—It is officially announced here that the Turkish forces east of Erzerum have been completely routed by the Russians and have fled to that stronghold. The Russians have taken 9000 prisoners and 16 guns. Fighting has been renewed south of Alashkert, but the Kurd horsemen and their Turkish reinforcements have been driven back.

ROME, Nov. 27.—The Italian Consul in Jerusalem has asked the Italian Foreign Office to send warships to Jaffa, as it is feared that anti-Christian riots and massacres may follow.

Reports to hand from Jerusalem state that all the British, French and Russians in the city have been imprisoned, and are being harshly treated. The opportunity has been seized by the Turkish soldiery to loot their houses.

The Turkish authorities showed reluctance to repress the agitation, but the Consuls of neutral countries insisted that two soldiers who looted a Greek church and murdered its priest should be subjected to exemplary punishment. The soldiers were accordingly hanged.

BERLIN, Nov. 27.—The German Press Bureau gives out the following: "The Turkish Embassy at Rome says that the Egyptian advance guards on the Suez Canal deserted to the Turks."

"A dispatch from Bern says reports from a reliable source set forth that the French losses up to November 1 were 120,000 men killed, 370,000 wounded, and 167,000 missing."

"Reports of a pan-Islamic anti-British movement are confirmed by the Russian Slovo of Petrograd, which says that the movement had its beginning in Afghanistan."

"The Porte says that all Arabs who are fit for military service have declared their readiness for a holy war."

"The Russian Legation at Constantinople has received information from Tabriz that Kurdish troops surprised a Russian garrison and killed 2000 of them."

AUSTRIANS REPULSE CZAR  
IN CARPATHIAN BATTLE

Vienna Statement Also Reports Success in Galicia.  
VIENNA, Nov. 27.—Fighting in Russian Poland has assumed the proportions of a continuous battle," declares the Austrian official statement issued today.

"In western Galicia we repulsed the Russians. Marked progress has been made in the Carpathians near Colubra. The enemy's centre is very strong near Laczarevitch, but we attacked there and took 1200 prisoners, three guns, four ammunition wagons and three machine guns."

HOLY WAR PROCLAIMED

Official Notification to Moslems Published in Constantinople.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 27.—The proclamation of a holy war was published here for the first time today, although it was announced nearly two weeks ago.

It is signed by the Sultan and 23 Mohammedan priests, and calls upon the entire Moslem world to rise against the English, Russians and French.

WAR MOVES FIND RUMANIA  
READY TO SIDE WITH ALLIES

Passage of Czar's Troops Down Danube to Save Serbs From Disaster Indicates Complaisance of Balkan Neighbor—Bucharest's Ambitions.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—Report from Sofia that 15 regiments of Russians have arrived at Radievatz, in Serbia, is of sensational significance, if true. The statement asserts the Russians have made the journey along the Danube River. The Danube emptied into the Black Sea after crossing Rumania, and if the Russians have used the river to reach Serbia, they have violated Rumanian neutrality.

The slaves could not have passed through Rumania in this manner without the knowledge of the Bucharest Government. As a neutral Power Rumania must have prevented this movement of troops by one of the belligerents, or else have seen its neutrality violated, as was Belgium's. There is no doubt of the ability of the Rumanians to prevent the Danube being used by the Russian army. That they have not done so can only mean the Rumanian Government has voluntarily disregarded its neutrality.

The inevitable inference is that the Bucharest Government has concluded to enter the war on the side of the Allies for the purpose of enlarging Rumanian territory at the expense of Hungary. Other circumstances bear out this conclusion. The Rumanian Legislature will be convened tomorrow, and it is probable that the Cabinet will be called upon to make a definite explanation of its intentions.

Rumania wants all it can get if the Allies win the war. Its maximum demand probably is the annexation of the Hungarian provinces of Transylvania and Bukovina. Russia, however, having already captured Bukovina, desires to retain this province. Nevertheless, there is pressing need to rescue the Serbians from Austria's victorious army. Because of this fact Rumania is now in a better position to exact maximum concessions than it would have been earlier in the war, when the Serbs were invading Bosnia.

What the terms really are doubtless will not be known until the war ends, but if Russia has been able to transport troops up the Danube, it is the inevitable conclusion that Rumania has been promised a large territorial payment.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 27.—Disaster once more has overtaken the Germans in Poland. Their second army of invasion is smashed.

The battle of Koljuchki is the crowning victory of the campaign in Poland. What is left of the German army is being pursued, surrounded by a wall of Russians. The Kaiser's generals are fighting desperately to regain their own frontier. When the final cost is counted Koljuchki will be found a greater blow to German hopes than either Lemberg or the Saa.

Koljuchki, which is about 20 miles directly east of Lodz and is a junction of three railroads whereby troops reach the Vistula valley, was of vital importance to the Germans. To anticipate a counter attack they made a demonstration against Lodz.

This effort infuriated the Russians, who balked for the moment from invasion of Silesia, turned to face the Germans on the new quarter.
