Phillie Deal Held Up



Those who draw their fame from the field of sport generally pay the price. This fame often comes swiftly, but it is rarely enduring and only too often fades out as abruptly as it came. In no other byway of life can a contender reach the top in such brief space - and then be forgotten so quickly.

Considerable Up and Down

In 1910 McDermott came from out a side street in Nowhere and tied Alex Smith for the open championship. His achievement was held to be a fluke. In 1911 he came back and beat Smith, winning the open. In 1912 he defended his title against the field. He maintained this height over a wide range, extending from Philadelphia to Chicago, to Buffalo. He settled beyond any doubt the query as to who might be America's greatest golfer. In 1913, at Shawnee, he proved again that American-made goods were the best by leading Harry Vardon 13 strokes in a 72-hole test, leading Ray by an even wider margin.

Last Stand

Here, in 1913, was a young golfer just coming into his own. He was then under 25 years of age and yet the proved master of them all. He had no weakness with any club, a stolid temperament for the game that at the same time was mixed with bulldog tenacity and courage. In all his life he had neither smoked nor drank, keeping himself in fine condition through clean life in the open.

WELSH-SHUGRUE BATTLE IS ATTRACTION TONIGHT

Clever Lightweights to Contest in New York Ring. NEW YORK, Feb. 8.-Freddie Welsh, the lightweight champion of the world and the first British boxer to hold this title since 1894, will cross gloves with Joe Shugrue, the youngster from Jersey City, in a 10-round contest at Madison Square Garden tonight. Welsh will be in his most defensive style, to wipe out the attack of the defeat he suffered at Shugrue's hands in the first battle. The boys weighed in at 135 pounds at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

TRACK ATHLETICS AND BASEBALL IN LIMELIGHT AT PENN

Rowing Candidates Also Getting Down to Work. Big Squad Is Out Daily on the Track and Field.

The spring athletic campaign in three major sports at the University of Pennsylvania really begins today. In track athletics, rowing and baseball, the candidates, with their minds freed from the anxieties of the mid-year examinations, emerge from the dequatory period of preliminary work to the serious business of trying to make their varsity teams.

Track sports hold the attention of the biggest body of the students, for there are now nearly 250 men trying for this team. Within the next two weeks the candidates should pass the 200 mark and create a new record for numbers at least. At the same time the track situation is serious. No Pennsylvania team ever set a record in the state track meet.

For the first time in a good many years fortune smiles on Pennsylvania's oarsmen. Last year Vivian Nickalls was the miracle worker of the Poughkeepsie coaches and his men finished just a length back of Columbia for first place. Of that crew the Quakers have lost only two men. They are ex-Captain Watrous and Blatz.

Not only are all the other members of that splendid eight again trying for the crew, but two other men last spring through illness are among the candidates and will be very hard to dislodge from varsity berths. They are Shoemaker and Littleton, former strikers, who were lost through illness. It's a question whether Coach Nickalls will ultimately decide to substitute either man for Marcy at stroke, but if not both can be used in other seats.

It takes supreme optimism to see anything bordering on a championship team in the baseball squad. Five of last year's first string men have been lost through graduation, including the star pitcher, Sayre and Schwert, one of the best any college ever had. The other men missing are Minda from center field, Haley from right field and Williams from third base.
