PENN BASEBALL TEAM LACKS HURLING STAFF; FACES HARD SCHEDULE

Not a Top-notch Pitcher on Prospective Squad — Infield Is Strong — Heavy List of Games With Big Colleges.

AS Pennsylvania's baseball team approaches the opening of its collegiate schedule, set for Saturday, March 27, it becomes more and more evident that the Quakers are unlikely to equal or approach their record of 1914, when their team was admittedly one of the best in the East.

This conclusion is based on the fact that the pitching staff lacks a single high-class twirler and the additional impression that it is not to be a heavy hitting team. Any college baseball team to be a top-notch pitcher, must have at least one good pitcher and a team with considerable strength in the bat.

Last year the Quakers had the best pitcher in college ranks in Sayre, a catcher much above the average in Schwert, and a splendid fielding team. This year Sayre and Schwert are gone, and there do not seem to be any players of their calibre in the 1915 squad.
