THREE LOCAL WOMEN IN RACQUET EVENT

Mrs. C. N. Beard, Miss Agnes Kennedy and Miss Phyllis Walsh, Quaker Trio, Remain for State Tennis Title.

HAVERFORD, Pa., June 1.—Three Philadelphia tennis players, one each from Morristown, N. J., New York and Baltimore, one from California and one from Newport, remain in the competition for the women's championship of Pennsylvania and Eastern States in singles upon the conclusion of the third round at the Merion Cricket Club, Haverford, today.

The Philadelphiaers are Mrs. C. N. Beard, Wynwood, and Miss Agnes Kennedy and Miss Phyllis Walsh, of Merion. The others are Mrs. Marshall MacLean, Morristown, who, as Miss Helen Homans, won the national title in 1907.

Miss Eleanor Carey, Baltimore; Miss Clara Cassel, New York; Mrs. D. P. Wood, California, and Mrs. Barger Wallace, Newport Casino.

Mrs. MacLean today eliminated the last of the Bostonians, Miss Eleanor Sears, quite handsily in straight sets, Miss Sears winning a single game in the first set and four in the second.

A rattling five-three-set match took place between Miss Kennedy and Miss Edith Funk, another Merion girl. Miss Kennedy took the first set after 12 games and lost the second by four games to six.

In the third set Miss Kennedy won a point of the match, with games 6-5 in her favor, and advantage in the twelfth game, Miss Kennedy then won three points, taking the set, 6-3.

Miss Dorothy Disston, Philadelphia Cricket Club, who early in the day defeated Mrs. Paul, of Merion, in the last of the second-round matches, was outplayed in the third round by Miss Clara Cassel, the New Yorker winning in two sets, 6-2, 6-2.


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UNION BOAT CREW BEATEN Crack Four Bows to Defeat by Weld Boat Club of Harvard.

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DORVAL RACE TRACK IS MUCH IMPROVED

New Process Rolled Makes Track Fully 4 Seconds Faster for the Mile—Last Year's Track Wouldn't Pack.

MONTREAL, June 1. A wonderful improvement has been made to the track at Dorval since last season. Manager Holman and Sheridan Clark have had a force of men at work experimenting with a new process to improve the track conditions, and it has been pronounced a great success. The track was first treated to a solution made up of two barrels of blue clay reduced to a souplike state, and this was added to a sprinkling cart filled with water.

It was spread on the track with a light harrow following to mix the soil together. The track was then rolled with a heavy roller on the inside and a light one on the outside. Calcium carbide, 30 tons to the mile, was next spread. This vaporized and left the soil slightly oily, which not only keeps down the dust, but makes the surface sort of packy.

Last year the footing at Dorval was deep and would not pack. This year the going is fully four seconds faster to the mile, and by next fall the track at Dorval should be the fastest in Canada. It is said that H. D. Brown will treat the track at Marianna in the same manner during the summer.

Joseph A. Murphy is the reading steward here this spring, representing the Canadian Racing associations, James Milton is the starter, Francis Nelson the presiding judge, Sheridan Clark the racing secretary and Joseph McEneaney the clerk of the scales. Major J. T. McBride and Dr. L. J. Lemax are the associate stewards.
