

CORNELL BEATS PENN NINE; PIRATES WIN FROM PHILS, 2-1; ATHLETICS DEFEAT TIGERS

REPRISAL RAID OVER ENGLAND KILLS FIFTEEN

Zeppelin's Bombs Sweep Northeast Coast in Ninth Deadly Foray.

Fifteen Wounded Heighten Heaviest Casualty List Since Air Assaults Began Last January—Six Dead Highest Previous Total.

LONDON, June 15. Switching their zone of operations the Germans made a devastating air raid over the northeast coast of England last night, killing at least 15 persons, wounding 15 others and causing fires.

Official announcement of this raid was made today by the Admiralty. According to the official statement, "15 persons were killed, 15 were wounded and fires were caused by incendiary bombs dropped from the Zeppelins."

This is the heaviest loss of life recorded in any of the nine Zeppelin raids on England.

In the June 1 bombardment of London (the seventh raid) six persons lost their lives. In the first raid, January 19, over the Norfolk coast, the Zeppelin marauders exacted a toll of five lives. In the last previous raid, June 4 (the eighth), five were killed.

The latest aerial foray is supposed to have been made in retaliation for the air raid made by the Allies' aviators over Karlsruhe, capital of Baden, on Monday.

All recent raids have been made by Germans on the southeastern coast in the vicinity of London.

Following out its new policy of suppressing the names of localities attacked, the first official statement from the Admiralty today stated that the "northeast coast" was bombarded.

Great arms and shipbuilding factories are located along the northeast coast of England and these may have been the object of the Zeppelin attack. The Armstrong Works, at Newcastle, and the Dorman-Long Works, at Stockton and Middlesbrough, manufacture shells. Important ammunition and shipworks are located near Hartlepool.

AIR ATTACK ON KARLSRUHE IN RETALIATION FOR RAIDS Official Statement Gives Motive in Bombardment of City.

PARIS, June 15. The French version of the attack by a Zeppelin on the German city of Karlsruhe is contained in the following announcement:

A large squadron of allied airmen yesterday raided the city of Karlsruhe, capital of Baden.


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GERMAN EMBASSY BRANDS GERHARD STORY AS FALSE Bernstorff Envoy Not Member of Kaiser's War Ministry.

900 PENN STUDENTS HEAR PROF. SCHELLING DEMAND 'FREE SPEECH'

Largest Class to Leave University Founded by Franklin in Its 175 Years of Life Listen to Advocate of Academic Liberty.

An army of 900 students—the largest class graduated from the University of Pennsylvania in its 175 years of existence—received degrees today at the commencement exercises held in the Metropolitan Opera House, after hearing an address by Prof. Felix Emanuel Schelling, head of the English Department, in which he made a stern demand for academic freedom of speech and in thinly veiled allusion, delivered an attack on the national policies of Germany.

"A teacher does not abdicate his right of opinion as a man, even in the things in which he is not expert, when he decides to walk that straight—and, some would have it, narrow—path wherein walks the teacher," Doctor Schelling said.

"We do not demand of the lawyer that he express himself only on the law, nor of the moneyed man that he discourse only on finance. We allow to the clergyman a latitude of opinion on all subjects, save religion, wherein his fellows of the cloth may be trusted to hold him to a strict accountability. Then why should we not demand for the teacher a similar freedom of speech and opinion?" he asked.

ITALIANS OPEN NEW INVASION THROUGH PASS

Cadorna's Army Undertakes Desperate Maneuver Via Stelvio Road.

Powerful Fortifications in Region of Monfalcone Canal Stem Advance of Latins Upon Trieste—Rome Admits Check.

ROME, June 15.—The Italians have undertaken a new invasion of Austria through Stelvio pass. Furious fighting is in progress there, with the Italians attacking the summits of the pass, which are still in Austrian hands and are defended with heavy guns.

"Powerful enemy defensive works," the War Office admitted in an official statement today, have halted the Italian advance toward Trieste from the direction of Monfalcone.

Strong Austrian batteries, concealed in old stone quarries along the region of the Monfalcone Canal, shelled Bersaglieri troops vigorously. The enemy was immediately engaged by Italian batteries posted at Monfalcone and in the "feeling out" process the Italian artillery continues without cessation.
