POLO GROUNDS, New York, Sept. 2.—The Giants dropped the first game of a double-header here today to the Phillies, 1 to 1. Captain Larry Doyle made a costly error in the fourth inning that gave the visitors two of their three runs.

Jeff Treasau pitched for the Giants and fanned 10 men. Chalmers allowed seven hits, but with men on the bases the Giants were unable to connect with his shots. COUNTRY CLUB, Detroit, Mich., Sept. 2.—E. E. "Ned" Sawyer, of Wheaton, played by most experts to win the national amateur golf crown here today. Sawyer, put out of the running this afternoon by former champion, Robert A. Gardner, of Hinsdale, Chicago. The East will have a representative in the semifinal tomorrow, for John G. Anderson, of Seward, New York, two years ago runner-up to Travers, defeated the Southern star, Nelson Whitney, by 3 up and 2 to play.

Gardner finished the morning round in the lead over Sawyer by four holes. Sawyer played very below par, for him, and needed an even 80, his poorest round of the tournament. Gardner, on the other hand, was but two strokes over par with a 75. This afternoon Gardner, content to play safe and retain his lead, was a comfortable winner by 7 up and 6 to play. 

BENDER, ALL-AROUND SPORTSMAN, RATED AS ONE OF BASEBALL'S BEST

The passing of Chief Bender was another one of baseball's tragedies. Around this date last season Bender had won 17 games and lost three, living in glory with a world series entry. He was still this Friday in fine health and in good shape, with one of the greatest arms and greatest baseball brains of the profession. The game has never known a pitcher who was any cooler under fire. Bender, in his day, was ranked by many as the greatest one-game pitcher of all time; that is, the greatest man to tackle one all-important battle with the issue at stake.

He and Mathewson were ranked as the two greatest money pitchers of the game. Both could be figured at their best under the final test, yet their temperaments were not alike. Both were possessed with extreme coolness, rare judgment and abiding courage. But where Matty was tense, watchful, alert, Bender carried a careless ease that no other slaban ever had. The most momentous occasion of the season failed to produce any thrill in his unflinching breast. No one who saw the series will ever forget the manner he displayed toward the Giants back in 1911. In that first game Matty beat him in the hardest sort of a battle by the margin of 2 to 1. But even in that close fight where he was beaten the Chip-pewa chief finished the game with that careless grin intact.

An All-Round Sportsman

Bender was among the greatest all-around sportsmen of the pastime. He was a great pitcher—one of the best. He stood as the best golfer among ball players, averaging around 80. He was also a fine shot, ranking with the leaders. More than this, the Chief was a player, one who undoubtedly took the pleasure of playing above the pleasure of mere winning. He had a supply of good quiet humor always with him, and the hardest battle never drove this viewpoint into retreat. No one looked to see him break so quickly.

"I expected Bender to have at least three more good years," Eddie Collins said to the writer, "and I can hardly figure out his sudden slip. He was a good pitcher last year, with many years ahead, apparently. It must have been that he lost interest in his new league, and when Bender loses interest he finds it hard to drive himself."

"But he was certainly a wonder back in the old days, which are only a year or two ago. With the Chief right as he always was when needed, we always counted the game in and over and on the right side. And you can talk about the speed of Johnson and Runes, but I doubt that either had any more than this same Bender when he was at his best. He was not physically as strong as some others, but he had long, tapering fingers and a peculiar whip to his arm that certainly drove the baseball through the air. It came with a hop that was almost unhittable. It seems strange to see such a man, a man with such an arm, such a head and such a fighting heart, dropped out this side of 35."
