WOMEN URGE VOTERS TO BE REGISTERED

Suburban Branch of Good Government League Issues Strong Appeal

Active steps have been taken by the suburban branch of the Woman's League for Good Government, 812 Stephen Girard Building, to help persuade all voters to register in order that there may be a more nearly full registration than there has been in recent years.

To further the work of the league in this direction, the suburban branch has sent a letter to each of the members of the branch, together with circulars, calling attention to the importance of voters registering on one of the three registration days. The members are asked to give the circulars wide distribution.

They call attention to the importance of the voters registering in order that they may have a say in the election of city officials and also the privilege of voting on the constitutional amendments for woman suffrage and for providing funds for Philadelphia transit and port development.

The circular calls attention to the fact that last year 106,750 voters failed to register and were, therefore, disqualified from voting. The women assert in the literature, that "It seems a pity that there are more than 100,000 men in the city who will not take the trouble to be registered, although they have the right to vote, while women of the city who are willing and anxious to be registered and to vote are denied this privilege. To advance their cause the women of the Branch have adopted as their slogan, 'Get busy; get registered; get good candidates; get them elected.'"

Canal Route Inspected Route of Proposed Waterway to the Seaboard Visited

The route of the proposed New Jersey Ship Canal from the Delaware River to the Raritan Bay is being inspected today by a party under the auspices of the Atlantic Deep-sea Waterways Association. A delegation from Philadelphia is headed by Congressman J. Hampton Moore, president of the association; Wilfred H. Schoff, secretary-treasurer, and Dured Shuster, assistant secretary.

The inspection of the route, as surveyed by United States Army engineers, started from Trenton at 9:30 o'clock. It proceeded by automobile from Trenton to Perth Amboy, following the markers posted by the engineers. Among those in the party were Governor Fielder, of New Jersey; United States Senators Hu, Lee and Hartley; Mayor Frederick Donnelly and the City Commissioners of Trenton. There were also a number of Congressmen from New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

The party stopped in Jamestown for lunch. After dinner in Perth Amboy the visitors will leave on the homeward trip at 9:30.
