HOUSES FASCINATE ALLIES' COMMISSIONER AT BRYN MAWR SHOW

Monsieur E. Simons Comes to See Thoroughbreds, But Is Enchanted by Exhibit of Dogs

MONSIEUR E. SIMONS, Pa., Sept. 28.—Monsieur E. Simons, of France, commissioned by his government to purchase horses in this country for the Allies, wandered into the grounds at the Bryn Mawr Horse show today to look over the pick of this country's thoroughbred hunters and jumpers.

It happened, however, into the tent on the polo field where the American hounds were being shown. He got no further. Fascinated by the display of canines, he stayed there until the last ribbon had been awarded.

"I have never seen such dogs," he remarked to friends. "It's wonderful." His judgment was generally sustained by experts at the show.

The awards for the best packs were made in the horse show ring and the novelty made an instant hit with the crowd.

Interest as far as the horse show was concerned, centered around an unusual jumping class, the last of the afternoon. The horses were shown over the open course, which runs from the ring out over a portion of the polo field. As nearly as possible, the jumps that might occur in the hunting field had been erected.

There were a brush jump, a water jump, an earth jump, "worm and picket" fences. Forty horses were entered and the competition was unusually keen.

An interesting feature this morning was the appearance in the ring of a new Mather generation in the person of Charles E. Mather, 2d, a son of Victor Mather, who the other day, was a prominent horse show figure for many years.
