
DOUGHERTY MANAGES TAYLOR

RED SOX GET \$3951 AS SERIES SPOILS

World's Champions Distribute Coin, But Shy at Celebration

BOSTON, Oct. 14.—Manager "Bill" Carrigan, of the Boston Red Sox, received a check for \$39,511 from Secretary Bruce, of the National Commission, this afternoon, as the Red Sox's share of the world's series.

After Carrigan had divided the money he announced that there was a remainder of 13 cents.

Most of the players after receiving their checks planned to get away to their homes at once. This wish on their part led to urgent requests that Mayor Curley, Congressman Gallivan and others who proposed big receptions and banquets for the "champs" call them all off, in order to permit the players to leave as soon as possible for their homes.

The players themselves announced that they did not look for any public celebration of the team's victory.

As has been the custom for the last several years, the Boston Red Sox and the Braves participated in world's series affairs, tokens of appreciation for doing "hero" stunts were extended.

It was announced that Michael McNally, who played with the Red Sox during the early season, would share in the large check, but McNally was not present at the ceremony.
