
RICHMOND REMAINS DEFIANT

Suspended Clergyman Says He Will Preach Tomorrow at St. John's

"I shall preach in St. John's Church tomorrow" was the statement today made by the Rev. George Chalmers Richmond, who was sentenced to one year's suspension from the ministry by the three clergymen-triers. The militant rector means to occupy the pulpit both this and next Sunday and has not as yet received the admonition from Bishop Rhinelander. Doctor Richmond, who was adjudged innocent of 16 of the 11 accusations charging him with conduct unbecoming a clergyman and violation of his ordination vows as rector of St. John's Protestant Episcopal Church, 3d and Brown streets, has received word of the action of his triers, but in the absence of any official word from the Bishop insists that he will remain at the church. The worst offense charged against Doctor Richmond were his sermons and letters, in which the Bishop was flouted and the canons of the church sharply criticized. I was on these allegations that he was found guilty. Declining to discuss the results of the trial, the rector, when asked for a statement, contented himself by saying that he would be in the pulpit of St. John's during the remaining Sundays of the year. He added, however, that he would probably have a statement to make public tomorrow.
