NORTHCLIFFE'S NEWS OF AMERICA'S DEBILITY MISTAKEN

Wiedersheim Takes Issue With British Editor's Opinion Regarding Our Alleged Indifference

KEENLY ALERT

Northern's comments on the present situation in the United States, printed exclusively in the Evening Ledger, were correct in so far as they pointed out the possibilities, if the present state of affairs continues, but wrong in so far as America is going to do what Colonel Theodore Wiedersheim, at the head of the Philadelphia branch of the National Security League, and one of the city's most influential advocates of adequate national defense, are going to prepare for possible contingencies and effectively," said Colonel Wiedersheim. "Just how we are going to do it I do not know, nor does it matter to me. But it is going to be done, for the people are thoroughly aroused. All that is needed is the crystallization of the national defense sentiment, which is rapidly accomplishing such successes as the National Security League."

Colonel's remarks were directed against that part of the great English newspaper which he said: "The United States will be an immense amount of money as there will be, and you will have preaching wisdom, but his words will be drowned in such melange as 'I Didn't Raise My Boy,' etc." One day the Landlady or the Landlady will notice you are rich and will come and take what she wants. That Lord Northcliffe should entertain such ideas, however, is deeply significant, since his conception of the situation is correct or not, the fact remains that he entertains it. And it is not too much to suppose that others abroad are the same attitude of mind or may get it. Europe now those who were prepared those who were not know the fatality being among the latter. Should we do our provisions for national defense? It is not unlikely that somebody will be willing to take the chances of getting by such bungling. The only solution of the matter is to get on to prepare right. The American people know it. And that is why Northcliffe's deductions are not altogether correct."

GUARDS HIS CHUM'S DEAD BY THROUGH STORMY NIGHT

Collie Refused to Leave Playmate Who Was Killed

When dawn came today a curly black tramp cur, was found crouched in the cold roadway at 47th street and behind a wall, with his front paws on the stiff body of another curly black dog, his dead playmate.
The faithful dog had lain all night through snow and wind, wondering why there was no movement of the body and no answer to his barks. He moaned softly this morning when he pulled away and he made no effort to shake the snow from his back.
Chester short-line trolley car killed companion last night while the two were playing in the street. He refused to leave the body, and when the trolley removed it from the tracks he lay on his side, with his paws on the dead body. Efforts to make the dog leave were fruitless.
A long vigil was rarely disturbed by the passing of the trolley. He took dead animal away in his cart, and the dog followed for several days.
He returned to the Pennsylvania freight yards, at 47th street and behind a wall, where the two dogs made their home for six months. He is moaning today because of his loss.

R. A. C. ABBOTT KEEPS POST

Withdraws Resignation as Member of Board of Health

Alexander Crever Abbott, who tendered his resignation as a member of the Board of Health to Mayor Thomas B. Smith, has been urged to withdraw his resignation by Dr. Wilmer Krusen, Director of the Department of Public Health and Charities. Doctor Abbott has been urged to continue as a member of the board.
Abbott was graduated from the University of Maryland, School of Medicine in 1894, and was chief of the Bureau of Health and chief bacteriologist in the Department of Public Health and Charities from 1903 until 1909. During this time he also served as president of the Board of Health and continued as a member of the board from that date. Among the various medical societies with which Doctor Abbott is affiliated are the Pennsylvania State and Philadelphia County Medical Societies, the American Medical Association, the American Association of Pathology and Bacteriology, and the Philadelphia Pathological Society. He is at present professor of hygiene and bacteriology at the University of Pennsylvania.

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
