

NANCY WYNNE ATTENDS JUNIOR LEAGUE AT BELLEVUE-STRATFORD

Society Girls Take Part in Ballet of Orlando Given for the Benefit of the War Sufferers—Even the Scenery Painted by Members of the League

"AT LAST the great day arrived," to begin as all properly conducted tales should be begun, and the girls of the Junior League, who for weeks had been busily rehearsing and painting with success, saw their efforts crowned with success for the "Ballet of Orlando," with its riot of color and riotous rhythm of movement, was undoubtedly an unqualified success.
