LONG, VARIED BILL FROM STAGE SOCIETY

Six plays and five good-sized valets made a longer bill last night for the Philadelphia Stage Society than any presented in the city since the war. Possibly there was some excuse for the delay in shifting scenes. The society is doing all its own work behind the curtain, in a laudable effort to bring the expenses of production down somewhere near the 50-cent price of admission. And the knowledge that such excellent scenery can be put out at a cost of \$20, and that the deficit hitherto incurred is fast disappearing, would be some sort of compensation if it weren't for the obvious fact that scene-shifting is just as easy to rehearse as the lines of a play.

The amateur is prone to forget the importance of quick changes in keeping the auditor fresh and alert. It is a dramatic art. At the Little Theatre last night it was longer, four, eight and nine minutes in all, waited four plays that were not much cheering remark. "There will be no late admissions because the drama is interesting, it would have found them much more verting."

Certainly Franz Molnar's two bits had an undeniable cleverness, if the acting of a character in each was hardly such as to get the most out of them. One, "The Train," was an amusing sentimental satire love passage; the other, "The Last Hour," was a study in the grotesque and ironic. The conventionalities of the play of both were excellent, especially the cheerful pretense in the latter that a cat and dog horse, and not a couple of chairs, occupied the stage.

Another of the interludes was a minute sketch of undeniable power in the dark. It was St. John Ervine's "The Clock," and presented a "man" in a vivid contrast came a delightful bit of the critic, Henry L. Mencken, in which a dozen people in the audience, including two of his own profession, including the pianist himself, made no secret of his opinion of American dramatic literature.

Following the four dramatic interludes came a Russian playlet of some power, but of doubtful import, "The Little House," by George Calderon. As an Englishman's notion of Russian possibilities it strikes one as a little unnecessary, a little forced. All the same, well acted in its principal parts, the story of a mother who gives her murderer son up to the police rather than part with her illusions has emotional qualities.

The evening closed with a delightful genre comedy, "Vittorio," by P. S. George. Gaining a great deal from almost perfect acting and good direction, it set forth some amusing angles of the macabre and feminine without bothering itself over phobias or the depths.

William H. Whitney and Marie Deane again proved their professional caliber as the best actor and actress of the organization.
