"PRIESTS TOLD TO SHUN BALLS FOR CHARITY" Consistorial Decree Reported From Rome Puzzles Catholics Here

"I very earnestly commend to your interest, sympathy and prayers the movement, in which all those who are with the patient and humble co-operation of those who are, and may be, influential for his help, unmeasured good may come to all those who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth will share."

DAMAGED GOODS, SAYS M'NICHOL OF ENEMIES

Senator Makes Vitriolic Attack Against Brumbaugh. Lauds Penrose

Senator James P. McNichol's arraignment of Governor Brumbaugh and the Vice element of the Republican party as "damaged goods" and his eulogy of United States Senator Penrose as "the ablest, most courageous and best-equipped man in the United States" and a leader whom the speaker was proud to follow until death are regarded today in political circles as the opening gun in a bombardment of campaign oratory that is to lack nothing in vigor of assault until the votes are cast at the primaries.

Senator McNichol's remarks were delivered last night at political meetings held in West Philadelphia, the 15th Ward, and before the North 6th Street Business Men's Association. He branded the Governor as "the biggest failure ever elected by the Republican party in this State" and declared that "when his term has expired he will pass into oblivion and be forgotten sooner than any one who ever sat in the gubernatorial chair at Harrisburg."

The Senator denied the Governor credit for the passage of the child labor bill by the last Legislature, declaring that the measure lacked 17 votes, and was lost until "I came to the Legislature with a special message from Senator Penrose. That message was that the child labor bill must be passed. The credit belongs to Senator Penrose. That is a fact."

Judge Brown, of the Municipal Court; Senator Charles A. Snyder; McNichol's candidate for auditor general, and ex-Senator John J. Coyle, who aspires to the seat in Congress now occupied by George P. Darrow, also spoke at meetings last night. Their remarks, while pointed, did not cause such enthusiasm as was aroused by the speeches of Senator McNichol, who flayed his political foe mercilessly and proclaimed himself a contractor and proud of it.

He predicted that Senator Snyder, candidate for Auditor General, would carry the State by 150,000 majority.

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\$8000 FIRE MENACES JEFFERSON HOSPITAL

Fourth Blaze at One Address in Few Years—Nurses Quiet Patients

The fire shutters of the Jefferson hospital were closed today when an \$8,000 blaze swept a building at 125-127 South 11th street, about 75 feet from the corner of the hospital.

The flames, which constituted the fourth fire at the South 11th street address in the last few years, swept the third, fourth and fifth floors of the building, occupied by H. G. Osterle & Co., manufacturers of stained glass windows and church furnishings, shortly after 1 o'clock this morning. The origin of the fire is unknown.

The second and third floors of the building at 125 South 11th street, occupied by Jites & Blumenthal, glass manufacturers, were damaged by water.
