WILLIAM STELBAUER, the Athletic utility outfielder, who has been hitting the ball hard the last few days, is leading the American League batters with an average of .429 in 11 games, up to Thursday. However, George Burns, the heavy first baseman, has taken part in 21 games for a 411 percentage. Amos Strunk is the only other Athletic player to bat in the national circuit. Dave Roberts, of the Glants, is making pace with a .387 mark. Alexander, the Philadelphia pitcher, who has won four out of five games, also is showing up well on the team. He is leading the Philly batters with .363, while Eddie Burns, 327, leads the local club a second man in .342 batting average.

CAPTAIN MEREDITH RUNS LAST RACE FOR PENNSYLVANIA TEAM ON FRANKLIN FIELD TODAY

Ted's Final Effort Will Be to Lower Half Mile Record in Red and Blue's Dual Meet With Cornell

TED MEREDITH will run his last race on Franklin Field for Pennsylvania this afternoon when he competes in the half-mile race in the dual meet between Cornell and Pennsylvania, and to make the day one long to be remembered, Meredith will essay to run a half mile faster than he has ever been run by a human being.

Meredith now is the possessor of the world's title and record for running the half mile, as he won the 800 metres in the last Olympic games, and went the additional yards for the half mile in the marvelous time of 1:52 1/2. The Media boy now is at the top of his form. He never ran better than he did on relay duty, and he feels just as good now as he did then. In addition, Lawson Robertson, who brought Meredith around on the Stockholm trip, has been paying some little attention to Meredith during the last week, and this has not hurt the Penn captain in the least.

The half-mile is the only event in which Meredith will participate this afternoon. He knows there isn't a chance for Penn to win over Cornell, and rightly figures it useless to put himself up any more tests in the quarter-mile run. Therefore he is going to put everything he has into the half-mile event and run every step of the way in the hope of lowering a record that few persons believe can be trimmed in the East.

Meredith, however, is positive he can run faster than he did at Stockholm in 1912. While the Pennsylvania track is not the fastest in the country to try for records like this, Meredith feels that he will be his last opportunity as a collegian to essay a world's record. In the intercollegiate at Cambridge he will run in the quarter-mile, and in the Penn and Cornell races he cannot be expected to do as well as if he was running only one event.

Meredith will take the half-mile run this afternoon, but that is the only event in which Pennsylvania is sure of winning. Newletter has an even chance with Foss in the pole vault and Bertolo some days is as good as Culbertson in the broad jump, but in the other events Penn hasn't a ghost of a chance for first place unless Moakley should run second stringers in order to give the Penn team a chance.

Frank Kauffman will run in the sprints for Penn and the Red and Blue will not have a capable performer in the hurdles. Kauffman cannot beat Van Winkle, of Cornell, in either sprint, but he may beat Hartshorn, Lannon will not run for Penn today and it isn't likely he will run again this year. Report has it that he has broken down. Crim and Shelton, of Cornell, will beat Dorsey and Scudder, of Penn, in the quarter mile. Beckwith, of Cornell, will run behind Meredith in the half mile.

Windnagle and Irish will show the way to Humphries, of Penn, in the mile, and Potter and Hoffmire, of Cornell, excel anything that Penn can offer in the two-mile run. Starr, Gubb, Watt, Millard, Acheon and Lyford should make all six places for Cornell in the hurdle races, and Richards, Howell and Moore, of Cornell, should take all three places in the vault. Richards will also win the high jump and place in the broad jump. Sewell, of Penn, and Cheney, of Cornell, should have a fight for third in the vault. McLaughlin and Cady, of Cornell, are more consistent jumpers than Crane, Tibbott or Bucholtz, of Penn. McCormack, of Cornell, should win the hammer, with Mathews, of Penn, and Jewett, of Cornell, nip and tuck for second.

Previous to the Cornell and Pennsylvania meet the Penn freshmen and Princeton freshmen will engage in their annual dual competition on the track. This should be a mighty interesting contest. Cornell is the best that Princeton offers in the dashes and he is no better than Frazier, Bonack or Walter in the 100 yards and is not as good as Smith, of Penn, in the 200. Smith will have his work cut out for him to beat Clark, of Princeton, in the quarter-mile. Charles, of Princeton, has a shade on Walker, of Penn, in the half, but Charles, of Penn, should win the mile and Betts, of Penn, should win the two-mile.

Wickersham, of Penn, should beat Erdman, of Princeton, in the high hurdle, and that of Princeton, should beat Erdman over the low sticks. Kissam, of Princeton, is a better broad jumper than any of the Penn freshmen, while Hampton, of Penn, is a better high jumper than any of Princeton. Penn should win all three places in the vault, as the Tigers haven't a good vaulter. Van Ginkle is better than Funk, of Princeton, in the shot-put, and Meyer, of Penn, is better than Funk in the hammer throw.
